





I really hope you all had a good Christmas, and from all of our WI ladies a very happy and healthy New Year. Now we can look forward to our summer holidays!

I think we all want to leave Covid memories behind us, but in October we welcomed Sue McDonnell who was the lady who started Taunton Scrubbers. She started in a very small way in her home and, although she herself 'could not sew', very soon she had people contacting her asking if they could help in any way to make some scrubs and masks for the nurses in the hospital and care homes.

Sue began by purchasing the fabric and cottons out of her own pocket, before obtaining some local funding to cover these costs. 

Support Your Local Rugby Club -Taunton Rugby Club

Taunton Rugby Football Club was founded in 1875 and in the 147 years since it has played home matches at various locations around the town before moving to their current ground at Hyde Lane, Bathpool in 2001. Taunton now play in National League 1 which is the third tier of English Rugby and the current league position would rank Taunton in 33rd in the country. This is the highest league in which Taunton have ever played.

The club runs two senior teams, Taunton Titans and Taunton Warriors, a ladies team and provides coaching for children from the age of 5 upwards. Details of how children can take part in the Sunday morning coaching sessions can be found on the Taunton RFC website. As a sport rugby union is dominated by one word - RESPECT. This is respect from the players towards the officials, respect from the crowd to the players and officials and respect between the players. At Taunton this is emphasised from the very beginning. Teaching self-discipline is also an integral part of the coaching at Taunton as an ill-disciplined team will soon find themselves penalised on the field. So what is the matchday experience like? Well before the game kicks off there is the option of attending the pre match carvery lunch. Every



club at Taunton's level provides a pre match lunch. Taunton's lunch venue is magnificent and anybody seeing the tables elegantly laid out cannot fail to be impressed. Taunton's lunch is constantly referred to as the best in the league by the officials from Taunton's opponents. There are four choices of meats, loads of vegetables to choose from with other dietary requirements accommodated. Lunches should be booked in advance. Everyone is made to feel welcome, and the lunch is always an enjoyable experience with a friendly atmosphere.


After the lunch it is time for the match. There is seating accommodation on both sides of the pitch or the game can be watched close up from the touch line or from the warmth of the dining area. The standard of the rugby is very high at this level. The players are semi-professional and both Taunton and the opposition give their all week in week out, risking life and limb for their enjoyment and for the entertainment of the crowd. Many former Taunton Titans play for Premiership teams and, not all that long ago former Taunton players Ben Moon and Sam Skinner played for England and Scotland respectively.

This season is Taunton Titans' second in National League 1 and they are finding it a bit of a struggle. They are not in the relegation places, but it is beginning to look like they are one of 6 teams from which the 3 relegated teams will emerge. It would be a massive boost to the team if there were bigger crowds cheering them on so why not pay a visit to the ground just a 5-minute walk from the New Mill Public House on the Bridgwater Road with plenty of parking (free in the overflow car park opposite the main entrance to the ground).

Rugby Union is a great sport and at this level it can be a great spectacle. All the skills of the game are on show together with the physical commitment. You will not see players feigning injury, arguing with the referee, or showing dissent. This is because of the respect and self-discipline drummed into players from an early age. So why not give Taunton rugby a try. Win, lose or draw the entertainment is superb. You can come and have a pre match lunch or just come for the match and give the team a cheer and if you enjoy it bring a friend next time. January 7, 14 and 28 are dates for the next Titans' home fixtures.

Gardening Corner

All Hail the Kale!

By the time you read this, the sun will be strengthening again, the days will be longer, the nights growing shorter. The great wheel turning and bringing us another year, another spring. The colours of the landscape change with trees from a distance, seemingly transformed as early buds swell and bark begins to shine. Far too early to be sowing anything, now is the time to make the most of any winter crops you have growing.




All hail the mighty Taunton Deane kale! This one is over 6 feet tall.

Brassicas are the stars of winter and kale is among the best of them. Sowing a selection of small, round, mustard like seeds in July can give you rich pickings throughout the winter even in the coldest periods. I like to sow Tuscan Kale (Cavolo Nero) every year but always try new types along side it. Redbor, a deep purple F1 kale is our new favourite as it stands so well over winter without any support and also seems less attractive to cabbage white butterflies as it is bulking up over the summer months. I have also started growing perennial kales, particularly a local heirloom variety called Taunton Deane'. These provide tasty pickings of deep green leaves with red ribs all year around and are super tough plants. They propagate easily from stem cuttings and if left unpruned will eventually turn into woody shrubs, I saw some in the walled garden at Knightshayes gardens near Tiverton a few years ago that were at least 10 feet tall! If you only have a window sill, kale seeds

germinate and grow quickly and can give you tasty and nutritious baby leaves from a small pot or two.

Somerset Birds

It has, in some ways, been an extraordinary autumn. November began dry and mild, warm even, then became one of the wettest recorded, although mild temperatures prevailed. During the middle of the month we experienced a strong southerly airflow. At times winds originated from the south of Spain and brought numbers of a very rare species to our shores.

The Common Swift is a familiar bird in our summer skies and there are a number of small colonies in and around Taunton. Apart, obviously, from nesting it spends the whole of its life on the wing and is

superbly adapted to do so. So well developed are its long scimitar-like wings and associated muscles it is generally

unable to take off when accidentally grounded. Having



very short legs makes regaining the air almost impossible. Its habitat can truly be said to be the skies.

Our Swifts are with us for a brief period only, from late April to early August. They nest in holes in old buildings and especially under roof tiles. Sadly modern housing and the renovation of properties has robbed them of many nest sites. Pleasingly there are a number of nationwide schemes in progress to arrest the steep decline for which loss of nest sites is partly responsible. A newly published book by Sarah Gibson about Swifts and the problems they face, is an excellent read, full of interesting facts and without the usual plethora of scientific data that makes similar monographs unappealing (Swifts and Us, Collins, ISBN 978-0-0-835066-6 £9.99)



Common Swifts breed over a huge swathe of Europe and Asia and are our only regular species, but the family is well-represented elsewhere. Spain alone has 5 breeding species. By mid-November our Common Swifts are harvesting insects over the equatorial forests of Africa and venturing as far south as Mozambique. It therefore came as a surprise to see Swifts turning up in Britain, often over twenty a day, and as far north as Scotland. Birders quickly twigged that in all probability, these were not Common Swifts at all. The Pallid Swift is an identification challenge even for the most experienced birders. Paler it may be, but not obviously so. If seen well a suite of subtle features will often confirm it, but given its behaviour this is rarely easy. It breeds alongside the Common Swift around the Mediterranean and this sometimes makes things easier. If you've taken any notice of Swifts in southern Spain you will certainly have seen the two together.

Pallid Swift is a very rare bird in Britain, generally with one or two annual records. These multiple arrivals were undoubtedly caused by our unusual November weather. The plume of air, originating so far south, would have been rich in insects and these, and the Pallid Swifts that feed on them were carried north. As the winds shifted westerly, the invasion abruptly ceased, and these strong flvers would have had little difficulty in returning to their usual haunts. Nearly all were recorded at well-watched coastal sites with a few inland birds noted near reservoirs and wetlands, favourite feeding areas.

Records are still being complied and analysed, but it seems clear that as many as a hundred were seen. Several were probably missed surprisingly few birders spend much time staring skywards! Given the conditions it was odd that few other rare southern birds were dragged northwards, but several very rare moth species turned up across the country at the same time. Time will tell whether this remains a one-off event, or whether our changing climate will

produce similar surprises.

Another uncommon but most attractive bird, this time from the north, has been seen in Scotland and along the North Sea coast and is one to look out for this winter. It has been a poor berry



year in Scandinavia and Waxwings have arrived. Numbers so far are small, but cold weather could bring a similar invasion to that of ten years ago, when several visited West Monkton. Keep an eye on the Cotoneasters!


The Community Gardeners are still providing freshly grown produce for the fridge which is soon used by locals and we would like to thank them for continuing to do this through these colder months.

Somerset Bus Partnership Welcomes Flat Rate Fare **Proposals**

Somerset Bus Partnership welcomes the Government's plan to provide up to £60 million, to enable bus operators to cap single adult bus fares at £2. The £2 flat fare comes in from the beginning of January and will continue through to the end of March 2023. Most bus operators are expected to adopt the scheme.

This means millions of people across England will save money, at a time when many households are suffering massive pressures from the rising cost of living. The move will help people travel for work, education, shopping and medical treatments and provide a much-needed saving in daily expenditure. The current average single fare for a 3-mile journey is estimated at over £2.80, meaning that the new fare will save passengers almost 30% of the price every time they travel.

In addition, Somerset County Council currently plans to introduce a £1 single/ £2 return bus fare in Taunton, as part of its Bus Service Improvement Plan. Somerset Partnership welcomes this initiative but Bus emphasises the need to procure further funding to enable this flat rate fare to be extended across all of Somerset.

Somerset Bus Partnership Co-Chair, Peter Travis, said, "Bus usage declined in Somerset in the last decade, and even more so during to the pandemic. We need initiatives like these to restore and improve passenger levels. Encouraging people to choose buses over cars helps to reduce carbon emissions. It is estimated that the Government's £60 million will reduce car journeys by at least 2 million and cut pollution and congestion for all of us."

Somerset Bus Partnership will continue to work closely with Somerset County Council to encourage bus use and ensure implementation of the Bus Service Improvement Plan across the county.

In this article, however, I want to talk about another recurring cost that many people forget to deal with - security software. Companies like Norton, McAfee, AVG, Bitdefender et al, all make security software to run on computers, phones and tablets to help protect you when you use email or go onto websites. Like so much in the world of tech these days, they charge per year, and, if you use one of these products but haven't done anything about it recently, you are probably paying too much at annual renewal. Security software is a highly competitive market.

The cost of living has rocketed for many, and everyone is looking to save where they can. Tech is no different. Ealier in 2022 I wrote a column called 14 minutes to save £150 - which was all about negotiating broadband bills down. People who haven't spoken to their telecoms provider for ages are sometimes paying £30/month more

All the companies listed above, and many more, want your business. So to entice you into their product offerings, they all have various 'first time buyer' deals.

Lets look at one such deal here from Autumn 2022. The product is 'Norton 360 Premium' which can be installed on up to 10 devices - so would cover a typical family's collection of devices. Fig 1 shows Norton's own website price for one year: £39.99. Seems a reasonable cost - but look at the small print. 'Automatically renews at £94.99 per year'! However, if we switch to a reputable UK-based software seller's webite (please note the need to buy from reputable, UK-based sellers), in Fig 2 you can see the same product is being sold at an introductory price of £19.99! Wait a minute, look carefully. This is £19.99 for TWO years cover before you need to pay anything more.

Then, the really important trick is this: TURN OFF AUTOMATIC RENEWAL. When the 2 years ends, buy the software again, as though you are a new customer.

There are always deals to be had.
