#### West Monkton Youth Group Needs You

West Monkton Youth Group has been running for nearly two years now (although some of that time was disrupted by COVID and the group was unable to meet) to cater for children from Years 5 - 9 (ages 10 – 14). It was set up with a number of aims in mind: Firstly, we recognised that there was very little provision of things to do for older children and youth and we wanted to provide a space within the community where they could gather and enjoy time together with a range of activities. From the beginning, our hope has always been that it becomes their group; that, as the group grows in numbers, it will be those attending who will decide what they want to do each time they meet, developing a plan of activities that they're keen to try.

- We were also mindful of that fact that there is quite a divide between Year 6 and Year 7 and that some children can struggle when making the move from primary to secondary school. In having a youth group running, our hope was that it would create an environment where different school year groups would be able to mix freely and build friendships that would not only ease this transition, but also help build a sense of community amongst our young people in Monkton Heathfield.
- Finally, we also set out with the aim of helping our children and youth become active contributors to the local community. We want it to very much be a place of fun and friendship, but also an environment in which children learn about what it means to be part of a community and to design and engage in activities that help it develop and improve.

When the pandemic permitted, it was running almost on a weekly basis, but is currently set to meet monthly, on the first Wednesday. Unfortunately, however, the group is currently unable to meet at all. We no longer have sufficient trustees on board to meet the minimum requirements to operate as a charity. We would, therefore, love to hear from anyone who would be interested in becoming a trustee. No prior experience of being a charity trustee is required and the level of commitment is not that high (we tend to meet quarterly and there are sometimes little things to do between meetings depending on what actions we've decided upon). If you'd like to volunteer in this capacity or would like to discuss the possibility further, please feel free to contact the Acting Chair of Trustees. Paul Elliston (bathpoolpioneer@gmail.com / 07765 388 655) to discuss further.

Alternatively, if you'd like to get involved, but don't feel that trusteeship is for you, then we would also welcome hearing from anyone who'd like to help out at the youth group sessions. We'd also welcome contact from anyone who has a particular profession, hobby or interest that they feel the youth group might want to hear about and/or experience and would be willing to share this with them at one of their sessions.

#### Somerset Birds

A question I am asked every spring is 'Why don't we hear the Cuckoo any more?', and it is a good one, because this iconic bird has disappeared from large

areas of lowland England, especially where intensive agriculture now forms the landscape. The Cuckoo

in Somerset, where it was once widespread. It is still found in two very different habitats, the high ground of the Quantocks and Exmoor and the Avalon Marshes. Key to this is the presence of the small bird species whose nests are parasitized, and an adequate food supply. Cuckoos are with us for a short time only, arriving in April and leaving in July (however see below).

The Cuckoo's far carrying song, from which it gets its name, is known to all, but not many people recognise the bird itself. Although there are many members of its family in both the Old and New Worlds, this is the only British representative. It is dove sized, and slender in appearance with long wings and tail. The head is small and the legs are short. The wings are frequently drooped when it perches, usually upright. In flight its rapid wing beats never rise beyond the horizontal. Superficially it looks like a small hawk, and is often mistaken for one.

The upper parts, head and breast are blue grey while the belly is white with conspicuous dark bars. The tail has white tips, visible when it is fanned on landing and the eyes are a striking yellow. Female Cuckoos are duller and have a rare colour phase, similar to a female Kestrel. I have only seen this once. Females have a quite different call too, a strange loud bubbling sound.

That Cuckoos make no nests and lay eggs in those of other birds is well known, but the details less so, and these are fascinating. After mating, a female will quietly observe victims and, after selecting a suitable host nest, usually in late afternoon, will remove an egg and quickly replace it by laying her own, The whole process is over within a moment. In following days she will repeat this more than 20 times in different nests. The Cuckoo egg develops rapidly and hatches within 12 days, often before those of the host. The youngster, naked and blind, has a hollow in its back into which it manoeuvres the host eggs or nestlings and, with great effort, ejects them.

With no competition the young Cuckoo develops rapidly, to the point after 19 days or so, it is much larger than its foster parents. It then leaves the nest and is fed for a further three weeks after which it migrates unaided to Africa. So loud and insistent is its begging that other species, passing with food for their own young, cannot resist feeding it. Several host species have been recorded, but in Somerset the main victims on higher ground are Meadow and Tree Pipits and in the Avalon Marshes, Reed Warblers. None of these have suffered declines due to the Cuckoo. Several theories exist to explain the drop in Cuckoo numbers but a paucity of host species seems improbable. In the last ten years however some intriguing evidence has emerged.

This is mainly down to the use of small satellite tags to track migrating male

Cuckoos. It is now known that some birds leave Britain not in July but as early as the first week in June, spending a mere six weeks here. It seems too that Cuckoos from England migrate to West Africa through Iberia



following a western flight path while those from Scotland and Wales cross the Mediterranean via Italy and fly a more easterly route through Africa. It may, therefore, be significant that populations in Wales and Scotland are stable or increasing while those in England are falling. Other factors are


certainly involved though, as habitat in England is now much degraded in comparison and a favourite Cuckoo prey, the hairy caterpillars of moths and butterflies is itself disappearing with intensive farming.

This year a tagged Cuckoo, named Colin, made the national press. Colin was tagged in 2015 and every spring since he returned to the same perch on a Surrey heath to the delight of his many fans. Sadly Colin failed to arrive this year. His tag transmitted for a while when stationary before falling silent and he was presumed dead. Six years or so is not a bad innings for a Cuckoo and Colin contributed much priceless information to researchers during his long life. Farewell Colin and thanks! Brian Hill

#### **Gardening Corner**

#### The Light Touch

How amazing our hands are. When we choose to use them properly we can hold our body weight on them, lift and rotate objects, move fast or slow.

We can feel the wind, the rain on our skins, tell seeds from stones in our fingers, we can crush with surprising force and we can cup rose limbs so delicately that the thorns don't pierce our skin. This last example is where I choose to dwell. The gentleness that we can bring to our lives.

My hands are strong, etched with scars from misadventures and starting to show the wear of years on their skin and tone. How strange that these hands still bring the softest of touches to seedlings as I prise them from one another and repot,. That can adjust with such speed the feel of one weed from

another, knowing the pressure and speed required to liberate the roots of a groundsel or a creeping buttercup from the soil.

Learning how and when to apply force to a garden is something learned with time. When you need to use a strong hand and intervene to bring balance or increase diversity, when to bring a light touch, gently editing or reshaping, and when to draw back your hand altogether and allow your eye alone to touch the garden.

### Letter from Rev. Jim



It used to be my custom to spend a few minutes in 'private prayer' in church before a service on a Sunday. But often, in these moments, people would come up

to me, tap me on the shoulder and say, "Just thought I'd grab a quick word with you, vicar, while you weren't doing anything." Probably why I stopped.

But, my private devotions apart, doing nothing <u>is</u> doing something. It's not necessarily a period we are simply waiting for something more entertaining or urgent to happen. Just being still, letting the body and mind settle is worthwhile.

In straightened times, there is often a lot of criticism of the long summer holiday. Indeed, a lot of university years consist of 3 lots of 10 weeks: 30 out of 52. "We could educate people in half the time if we just crack on", so the argument goes. The trouble is, 'crack on' is very close to 'crack up'

and that's a place we don't want to be. For many - particularly for those who work on the land or those who care for relatives (babies or elderly and infirm) - getting a break is almost impossible. And that is hard. It takes its toll. It is not something we need hold up as an enviable model to copy, rather one we should seek to relieve. There are rhythms to the agricultural year, there are cycles of life within families, there are national calendar dates. Times of frantic activity and times when things are easier. The church also has an annual cycle: dashing from Advent, through Christmas, Epiphany Lent, Easter to Pentecost. And then there is a pause known as 'Ordinary Time', which lasts about 20 weeks 'til we hit the All Saints/Remembrance cycle.

We are now in Ordinary Time. A time of 'nothing special' and that can be great. It is often the chance for Christians to be a bit more reflective about their faith rather than the fire-fighting madness of the festival periods. If we are lucky, we will get moments to actively do nothing, to find some stillness and allow ourselves to be renewed and refreshed as well as challenged and transformed as we allow the great truths of our story to settle within us.







Thank you to everyone who joined in, helped set up and clear up and donated their time and energy and cooking skills to the Street Party.



#### **Taunton Rugby Football Club**



The Taunton Rugby Club report in the May-June issue was prepared when Taunton Titans had just three games left to play of their National 1 season. Taunton were in one of the relegation spots in the league needing to overhaul Esher, who were two points ahead, to ensure safety. It looked a daunting task for Taunton especially as the first of these last three games was against the mighty Rosslyn Park who had scored 160 points to Taunton's 30 in their previous three encounters in this league.

Against Rosslyn Park, Taunton played well and were 10-0 ahead early on, but were trailing 15-19 at halftime then found themselves 22-26 behind early in the second half. Then came one of those magical spells of play with Taunton scoring five converted tries without reply to run out winners by 57-26, earning 5 league points. The



justified his selection, playing as if he were experienced at this level, and spectacularly scoring Taunton's final two tries to be awarded 'Man of the Match' much to the delight of his teammates and the crowd.

The only downside to the afternoon was the news that Esher had also won and like Taunton had gained a try bonus point for scoring four tries. The following week Taunton had a trip to Moseley, another famous rugby club. Trailing 22-7 Taunton staged a tremendous comeback scoring three tries in twelve minutes to lead 28-22 before Moseley hit back eventually running out winners by 32-31. Taunton however gained two league points by virtue of scoring four tries and finishing within seven points of the winning side. Esher also lost but collected just one bonus point.

Taunton now one league point behind Esher had to win the last game of the season and hope that Esher failed to beat the league leaders, Rams. Taunton were at home to already relegated Leeds and a bumper crowd saw the home side dominate the early stages scoring four tries in the first twenty minutes. Attention turned to Esher's match and to the home crowd's dismay the news came through that Esher had a healthy 19-7 lead in the first half. With Taunton running out comfortable 59-28 winners there was great relief when news came through that Rams had got their act together and run out winners by 33-19.

So, Taunton narrowly survived being relegated when they looked doomed after two thirds of the season. Having acquired only 24 league points from their first 17 matches the last 9 matches yielded 33 points. Some exciting loan signings strengthened the team but everyone at the club contributed especially the support from the large crowds at the last two home matches.

I have tried to encourage the readers of the Village News to come and support the club so if any of you readers watched those last matches and cheered the team on may I say a big thank you and hopefully you will come back next season which is now only a couple of months away.

Finally, following the Coronation of King Charles III, the man at

the rugby club known as Mr Taunton Rugby, Jack Matthews, received an invitation for him and his wife, Ann, to attend the Coronation Garden Party three days after the Coronation. The invitation cited that he had been invited for services to the community, but Jack is sure that it can only be for his connections

with the rugby club. Jack joined the club 65 years ago as a colt's player and has served the club as player, captain, chairman, president, and fundraiser. In the opinion of those at the rugby club a more deserving recipient of the invitation would be hard to imagine.
