





The HPS is a registered charity started in 1957 by the late Alan Bloom, a famous plantsman, to promote interest in and knowledge about herbaceous perennials. These are plants that die off in the winter but come back into growth in the spring and last at least 2 years; they encompass a wonderful array of different colours and shapes eg salvias, delphiniums, hardy geraniums, hostas, hardy chrysanthemums and penstemons. Our current President is Roy Lancaster, a man with a wealth of gardening knowledge.

There is a National HPS and then lots of local groups around the country; you need to join the National HPS before you can join the local group. Costs are £17 (£19 for joint membership) for the National group and £5 (£8 for joint) for our local, Somerset, group. Once joined, you receive two magazines a year from the National HPS as well as the chance to buy seeds once a year that members have sent in from a vast array of plants at very good prices. There is also a photographic competition you can enter and more information is available on the website (www.hardy-plant.org.uk). There are also specialist groups that can be joined, for example the Snowdrop group, the Peony group and the Variegated plant group.

The local Somerset group of the HPS (www.somersethps.com) is a friendly welcoming club of about 160 members with an active and varied programme of garden related events. From September to April there are monthly talks given by local and national speakers on a wide range of topics and are always of interest (previous programmes can be found on the website). These are held in West Monkton Village Hall on a Saturday morning, doors open 10.30 for chat and tea and the talk starts at 11am. The talks are free for members and guests are very welcome to attend (£5 charge). There is usually a Flower and Pot Plant of the Month competition as well as a bookstall and plant stall at each meeting. Once a year, there is a Plant Sale in

the hall, where there are many quality locally grown hardy plants at very reasonable prices as well as some specialist



nursery stalls (entrance £1 or you can hire a table for £5 if you are a member and have lots of plants to sell). We are also involved in running two plant fairs in the year, one in early spring at Yeo Valley Organic Garden, Holt Farm, near Blagdon and the other in June at Lower Severalls garden near Crewkerne. During the summer, there are several garden visits organised, either by coach or self-drive. We have visited some lovely places over the years, both locally and further afield eg the Orchid festival at Kew Gardens; they usually involve lots of plant buying at the nurseries, and tea and cake. We also send out 2 newsletters a year (online these days to save postage).

The date for the Plant Sale for this year is 22nd April at West Monkton Village Hall (10-12.30pm, entrance £1) and the Early Spring Plant Fair at Yeo Valley Organic Garden is on the 26th March, 10am-3pm.

We welcome new members to join us, whether experienced or novice gardeners who have an interest in knowing more about perennial plants and look forward to meeting you at one of our events.

Letter from Rev. Jim

I have a friend, an undertaker, in fact, who worked for a company for many years and then decided to go into business for himself. He



set up within our church building and over the next 5 years he made great sacrifices to ensure the business became a success. There were no family holidays, he had a smaller car and life had to become simpler.

I have another friend who got to the edge of, but never broke into the British Olympic swimming team. For years, every day she spent 2 hours before school in the pool and many hours at the weekends in competition. She never made it, but learned the popular lie about 'if only you want it enough'!

I may be biased by the newspapers I read, but it seems to me that self-sacrifice is respected in many walks of life – unless it's done for religious reasons when it suddenly becomes morbid and a sign of an inadequate personality.

Lent is upon us: or the time to 'give up chocolate' as it is popularly known. Religions across the world have times of fasting, self-restraint and focused piety. There will be a variety of reasons. Least among them is the 'personal well-being' advice to treat your body better - a sort of religious 'dry-January' – which is fine, but can sometimes be little more than a modern style of self-indulgence, in order to look fitter/slimmer/better...

The classic reasons for self-restraint in faith are:

- a) to relate to people who have less
- b) to learn to live with less for the good of the planet
- c) to exercise self-discipline and self-restraint
- d) to focus more attentively on the life of prayer.

It might be that after six weeks of this we establish a new life pattern; it might be that six weeks is all we can manage. It doesn't matter. Lent, like the other seasons of the church, is a gift to us to explore different aspects of faith. And so, I bid you a joyful Lent and trust it is an opportunity for us all to go beneath the surface of things.








Taunton Rugby Club

In my article about Taunton Rugby Club in the previous Village News I mentioned how the players put their wellbeing and their livelihood on the line every time they step onto the field (writes Robert Harris).

I would like to tell you about two players who have suffered horrific injuries which have had a major impact on their lives. First there is Freddie Fraser

who must be one of the unluckiest players injury wise ever to have played for Taunton Rugby Club. Freddie has been described as the toughest tackler in the club. He played a big part in Taunton's attempts to gain promotion to National League 1, the third tier of English rugby and the highest level the club had ever reached. His efforts were rewarded just before

COVID struck in 2020 as Taunton gained promotion. Freddie was a natural choice to play in the first match for Taunton Titans in their first match in the higher Division at Leeds but his participation in the match ended after 30 minutes as he suffered a broken leg which kept him out for the whole season. Fully recovered a year later he resumed his fully committed style of play but after just 10 games disaster struck again. A serious shoulder injury ended his season and, on medical advice, it ended his playing career too. Freddie is a PE teacher and

these injuries have had an impact on his career but he is now able to resume teaching PE. The second long term casualty is Andy England who has played nearly 50 matches for the first XV. He is currently recovering from a broken leg sustained while playing for the club. Andy's injury

means that he has been unable to do his job as a plumber and heating engineer for four months. These two examples show the risks the players take for the entertainment of the club's supporters. On the pitch results have been most disappointing despite many battling performances by the team. Taunton are in the middle of a



relegation struggle but in their most recent match at the time of writing they managed a much needed home win against fellow strugglers Esher by 27-18. Taunton were 0-12 behind after only 7 minutes but then showed great battling qualities to run out winners. Recent signings have lifted the quality of the squad and the team know that every match between now and the end of the season is one they can win.

Finally, if you want to experience rugby for free at Hyde Lane it is always worth coming to see the second XV in action. They are riding high in their league and have played exciting skilful rugby, inflicting heavy defeats on several opponents. The first XV (Taunton Titans) have home fixtures on March 11 and April 1 and 22. The second XV have a home fixture on March 4th. Somerset Birds

The common cormorant or shag Lays eggs inside a paper bag

Even if they cannot recite it in full many people will know the opening lines of Christopher Isherwood's whimsical little poem. Such a feat is beyond the most accomplished Cormorant but they are, nevertheless, in many respects, remarkable birds.

Cormorant is a generic name for a very large family of diving birds with a worldwide distribution. With only two regular species in Britain we fare poorly in comparison to countries such as New Zealand, where at least six species are recognised. Perhaps it is no bad thing because, in New Zealand, a large number of similar looking subspecies occur around the coast, some of which pose identification challenges.

We may have only two species to worry about here, but telling them apart can still be difficult for the inexperienced. The larger one is the Common Cormorant and the much smaller Shag, despite how the poem would have it, is a different bird altogether. The Cormorant is a familiar bird in Somerset and can be

seen on most waterways in the County, even smaller ones like canals. They can often be seen flying between them and have a goose-like appearance in flight and indeed are sometimes mistaken for such.

Originally mainly a coastal bird they have, within the past 50 years or so taken to breeding far inland. Being expert fish hunters they are unpopular with anglers and in many places, despite some protection measures, are persecuted, although this seems to have little effect on numbers. Colonies, nearly always in dead trees over water, can be seen on the Avalon Marshes in spring and early summer. Although some marine animals will take Cormorants, and gulls and other egg stealers will raid nests, Cormorants have few other enemies. This probably contributes to their success although marine and river pollution is an increasing hazard.

The Shag, so named for the curly crest it sports in the breeding season, is a smaller and much neater looking bird. Both species are essentially dark overall, with large webbed feet and an upright stance when perched. The Shag in particular has an attractive glossy sheen when seen at close range and both species, although rather

reptilian in appearance, have one splendid feature, beautiful emerald-green eyes that simply sparkle in sunlight. Many aquatic species dive to catch fish. Among these are the true Divers and some species of duck. Cormorants as a family

are unrelated but

nevertheless excel as fishermen. Both dive regularly

from the surface, the Cormorant sliding under like a submarine, the Shag with a leaping dive, one good way of distinguishing them at a distance. Ungainly and clumsy ashore, they are transformed underwater, chasing fish with ease and swiftly manoeuvring to catch them. Large fish rarely escape a pursuit and some, particularly flatfish, look impossible for the bird to swallow. However Cormorants have a very elastic gullet and by positioning the fish head on can swallow it without much difficulty, even though, to us, it looks a struggle. The birds do, however, have one problem unique among diving birds. Aquatic species in general have a full set of waterproof features, maintained in good order with oil from a preen gland. In Cormorants the body feathers are water resistant but the wing feathers are not, something evolution evidently overlooked. This means that after a fishing spell they literally have to hang out their wings to dry. They find a convenient perch ashore to do this and spend some time, often hours, to dry out digesting their meal as they do so.

The Shaq is a bird of rocky sea coasts, preferring deep blue water, and as such is rare in Somerset where our shores are unsuitable. Some occasionally stray up-channel to Minehead, and on both Devon and Cornwall coasts they occur in large numbers often entering fishing harbours. However severe storms occasionally blow them inland and they can then turn up in unexpected places. After one such autumn blow in 2017 a juvenile (brown coloured) bird visited the pontoon on the river opposite Morrisons, Taunton, It cared little about the curious watchers and had no trouble catching food. The ending was a happy one. After some days it recovered enough strength to depart and would almost certainly have made it to the coast.



So no paper bags required, and no need to worry about bears either - read the poem! Brian Hill

Some of you will be familiar with The Holman Clavel Inn near Culmhead in the Blackdown hills which lie south west of Taunton. It is said to have an extra member of staff.....

The Inn gets its name from a "clavey" – the large wooden beam that can still be seen over the fireplace in the cosy lounge bar. The wood is holly - or "holman" as was the old local name.

One evening a local farmer stopped at the inn after work and heard the story of "Charlie" - a tree spirit who inhabited the hearth at the inn - looking after the hearth but inclined to mischief. The farmer scoffed and jeered at the landlord's tale, stating there was no such thing as spirits.

A few weeks later the same farmer, his family and friends, and a few farm hands had ordered a meal at the inn. The inn staff laid the table next to the hearth, in an adjoining room, the food brought in and the guests were seated. This done, the serving staff withdrew the dining room, closing the door. Shortly, the door opened and a guest marched up to the landlord angrily demanding the table be laid and the food brought in. Confused, the landlord explained that this had been done - and he had seen his serving staff do it, which the servants confirmed. On checking the dining room, no food was laid, the table was bare - drinking tankards and goblets were neatly hanging up in their places with the table linen neatly folded on a window sill.

The landlord ushered out the dining party to the public bar and ordered the room be re-laid with food and dining utensils, drinks vessels etc. This was done, checked by the landlord himself. He closed the door and went to fetch the dining party to reassure them that the room was now definitely ready for them. On entering the room the farmer, who led the party turned aggressively to the landlord: "Is this a joke? We are hungry and don't find it funny!"

The landlord stepped into the dining room and to his astonishment the same scene met his eyes - no food, utensils gone, drinks vessels hung away, linen folded. He also heard something the rest of the party did not - a faint chuckle coming from the hearth.


Writing a gardening column for this time of year is hard. I'm writing this in late January so there is time for the magazine to be finished, printed and distributed, but spring feels like an almost unbelievable prospect. I rationally know that it has to come, but the cold still clings on, the sun is weak and the garden is largely sepia toned and bare. So I force myself to look. And in the garden I see the birds beginning to think about spring, their song and flight patterns changing. By the time you read this, they will be nesting or thinking about it, ready to fatten their young on the insect populations that can cause problems in the garden. Blackbirds and thrushes flip leaves in search of snails, slugs and grubs; blue tits comb the shrubs and hedges for clusters of aphids and caterpillars to scoop up and return to their nests.

Putting up nesting boxes is important to encourage these tiny but mighty pest control engineers, but it is also good to feed them through cold spells and to plant

a mix of deciduous and evergreen shrubs and trees, to give them cover from the worst winter elements.

These shrubs are important to the garden aesthetically too.

The evergreen



elements add structure and coherence when everything else is dormant and many of the deciduous shrubs we commonly use in gardens flower early in spring, carrying the garden forward to when the majority of herbaceous plants get going in late spring and early summer.



I like Witch hazels (Hamamelis mollis) and their close relative Carylopsis, both of which have gorgeous yellow blooms and don't get too big! Spinea mumberyii has long shoots covered in white flowers and grows to a similar medium shrub size. For evergreen cover, Osmontering delavagii gives you glossy deep green

leaves and fragrant white flowers in April – what more can you ask for in a shrub? All of these are currently available and are reliable plants that won't let you down.



Sighing over Sign In...

I'm often intrigued by seeing the online world through the eyes of my customers. One discovers just how confusing so many web sites are when helping people navigate it all. One such area of confusion is the 'Sign In' screen. To use shopping websites, surgery appointment websites, train & air booking sites etc., at some



point in the process, you have to 'Sign In'. This is so the service provider can identify who you are, as distinct from everyone else. Fair enough. Now, in past columns I have bemoaned the whole area of password creation and retention. But today, I want to look at the increasing myriad ways of signing in to a website. In particular I want to look at the issues from the point of view of working on a mobile phone. Using the example of popular 'cloud provider' company Dropbox, this is what their sign in page looks like when you first see it (Fig 1 left). Half the screen is the blasted cookie message! Once you accept or decline (there is a set of articles due on that topic

as well, watch this space), you then see Fig 2 right. What is the most prominent option being presented to you? 'Download app', for starters. Now that is a useful option, on a mobile phone, if you use Dropbox. But what is next most prominent? Seemingly two choices: Sign in with Google or Apple! People, not surprisingly, think they have to use one or the other. If you click on Sign in with Google, you then see Google log in screens which very much encourage you to create a Gmail address, if you don't already have one. Here's the point: you don't need to sign in with Google or Apple at all to any website (except their own of course)! Look carefully, and underneath is 'Sign in with Email' in a somewhat less clear font. Even if your email address is an @ gmail.com one, you don't have to "Sign In with Google". Those options actually mean you are giving Google/Apple permission to know what other online services you use. Article space prevents me recounting lots of other reasons to not do this. Always look carefully when signing in! Where you can, sign in with Email / Password options on websites!

8 ultras completed so far -3 more planned for this year.

At the moment, I'm training for my next ultra - the Isle of White (IoW) Challenge, 106k over 2 days, in April, with my son. So you're quite likely to see me in my Vegan Runners vest (though still walking) pounding the foothills of the Quantocks, and in and around the parish in general.

But, back to my completed ultras: I wrote about the 'South West Coast 2 Coast' in August 2021, which got my son and I addicted to this form of activity. We followed that up with a Virtual Trek to Kilimanjaro, which was actually a 50k walk over the Chilterns, accompanied by my 17yr-old Grandson, on the wettest day in September that year. But

we discovered, after an hour or so of steady downpour, that the rain no longer bothered us - it became the norm. And once we got our feet wet when it was no longer possible to avoid the large puddles that formed - 5 minutes later, our feet felt warm again and they were no longer a concern. Wouldn't you know it, just as we were finishing, in the half-light of dusk, the rain stopped!

Next was the Christmas Virtual Challenge 2021, a walk to the North Pole. I was going for the 400k trek from Canada, but I broke my leg in December, and had to scale back to 250k. Nevertheless I still received a medal for my efforts.

The leg was broken playing tag with my 8yr-old grandson, just before New Year. We were crossing the meadow on the public footpath which runs from just above St Augustines across to the corner between Noahs Hill and Red Hill. It had been raining, the grass was slippery, and down I went, fracturing my fibula. This was about 4 months before my next ultra, the Jurassic Coast Challenge (JCC), in May 22. The injury didn't hold me back long though, as after 6 weeks, when the cast came off, I started walking about 3k a day. Several of the hills on the JCC were pretty brutal! Steeper in places than Dunkery Beacon. Walking poles were an absolute necessity for me on the steepest ascents - my technique was to put both poles a few inches in front of me, take two paces through the 'gate' they formed, then reposition the poles a little in front of me. It was slow going, but I found it the only way. Ben and I had intended to do the full 100k continuous, but, on the last leg towards the halfway point, Ben told me he didn't want to carry on after Weymouth - the halfway stage at 58k. He'd begun to feel unwell - but he'd done brilliantly, since he'd only come off antibiotics the day before. So we were content with that 58k. achieved in 18 hours, with about 2 hours rest.

Towards the end of May, whilst doing my normal training, I combined it with the London 2 Brighton Virtual Ultra 100k - gaining another medal in the

In June I saw an item on Facebook asking older Vegan Runners to get in touch, which I did. The post was from two brothers, film producers, who were making a film called 'I Could Never Go Vegan', exposing and rebutting all the myths surrounding Veganism. They came down from Yorkshire to film a face to face interview, conducted in the Coffee Station cafe in Vivary Park (Highly recommended, their cakes are just delicious!) .They then said they needed to see me in action. As luck would have it, Ben was having trouble getting childcare for the next ultra, the SWC50 in August a loop from Dunster along to Porlock, up over the back of Dunkery, and back down to Dunster again. Tom Pickering, one of the producers, said he'd often thought about doing an ultra marathon, so he decided to take Ben's place and film me on the way round - and a worthy companion he proved to be! We set off at 7:30am, along with about 1200 others, along the road to Minehead, past Butlins, then joined the SW coastal path past Bossington, to Porlock Weir where we swung inland.

This is where the climbing began in earnest. I'd naively thought that, after the climb from Minehead up Dunkery in July last, the climb round the back of Dunkery would be easier. Well, it may not have been as steep, but it was steep - steep and long. The climb seemed to go on for ever. We finished after ten in the evening, 14 hours 40 minutes after we'd started.

Next came the Thames Path Challenge 100k (TPC100) - continuous - in early September 22, from Putney Bridge to Henley. The conditions were ideal, and we were both feeling in good form. We did the first 50k in under 10 hours - including pit stops, where we've learned not to sit down - getting going again is so much harder when you've been relaxing in a chair. We figured if we could keep up 4k per hour for the next 50, we could come in under 24hrs. That was our mistake - we pushed on too fast in the dark and at 58k I tripped over a malignant tree root, banged my head on the path and suffered a superficial cut. I got to my feet feeling not too bad but then I felt faint for a few seconds, so we decided to finish. We managed to get to the next rest stop at 61k - so that remains my one day distance record up from the 58k on the JCC. One day I'll manage a continuous 100k, but not this year, maybe 2024, when we're thinking of attempting the TPC100 again - figuring that if we take a lot more care after it gets dark, we could do it.

In October, I was asked to speak, alongside Tom Pickering, at VegFest, Olympia in London, about my path into veganism and my part in his film. The film is due for release 'very shortly', on either Netflix or Amazon Prime. Keep an eye out for it.

To finish the year, I did the 2022 Christmas Virtual Challenge - 250k from Russia to Lapland - between mid-November and New Year. I only just managed this, with the help of a 40k walk with Ben over the Quantocks on Christmas Eve.

So I've now done 8 ultras and my programme for this year is fairly set, I think - the IoW challenge; the SWC50 again, in August (mainly because it's on the doorstep); and the Chiltern50, in September. I just need 3 Virtual Challenges this year, to be up to date with my new goal of completing 100 ultras by my 100th birthday.

I'm hoping to get back into running in the summer which will be 18 months after my accident, the length of time my physio says it takes for ligaments to heal. I have to say, at 85, totally unexpectedly, I'm living my best life - and mostly I'm doing it for the animals. In all my activities I'm fundraising for Viva!, the animal rights charity. I know times are hard at the moment - but they're also hard for charities. If you are in a position to make a small contribution, you can do so

17th March 'Hive' Albania 2021 Drama Cert: 15 1 hour 24minutes



Blerta Basholli's award-winning debut feature is a film about honey and also about ajvar, a sweet dish from the former Yugoslavia made from aubergines and red peppers. But the film tastes fierce and sharp, like black coffee.

It is based on the true story of Fahrije Hoti, a Kosovan woman whose husband went missing during the Balkan wars of the 90s, and so just to stay alive and provide for her children, she formed a women-only collective with all the other war widows (or presumed widows, longing for definitive news of what Serb forces did with their missing husbands) making honey and other delicacies to sell. But the film shows her facing brutal misogyny and violence from the men in her village who feel she is getting above herself.

Fahrije started this business at least partly to manage or exorcise her grief: the hive in their garden was set up by her husband. This is her way of staying close to his memory; she remembers how instinctive his touch was with the bees and how he never got stung. Fahrije, on the other hand, is always getting stung, and this is partly why she switches largely to ajvar; each sting is a reminder. There is a marvellous scene in which Fahrije's young son is thoughtfully combing his hair in front of the mirror, with some adolescent stirrings of vanity, perhaps. Watching him, Fahrije suddenly smiles, with transparent love and pain, and without needing to be told we can see she thinks he resembles his father. Her own father-in-law Haxhi is a glowering figure, dealing with agony and grief in his own way, but gradually coming to value

This is a richly intelligent drama, in which every word and every shot counts.

21st April 'Flee' Denmark 2021 Animation Cert: 15 1 hour 29 minutes

An animated documentary telling the true story about a man's need to confront his past in order to truly have a future. Amin arrived as an unaccompanied minor in Denmark from Afghanistan. Today, at 36, he is a successful academic and is getting married to his long-time boyfriend. A secret he has been hiding for over 20 years threatens to ruin the life he has built for himself. For the first time, he is sharing his story with his close friend.

The Guardian says: A thrilling documentary made with a blend of animation and archive footage tells an immensely powerful tale of a gay Afghan survivor.

It's a genuine thrill to encounter a film as exciting and immediate as Flee. It's the kind of audacious and uniquely told story that should have audiences buzzing.

The true story at its centre is one that's tailormade for some form of cinema, a harrowing and suspenseful refugee narrative of loss and resilience, and director Jonas Poher Rasmussen could have brought it to the screen in many ways, almost all of them more conventionally easier than the one he finally chose.

While Rasmussen animates the majority of the film, there are also interspersed montages of archival footage, deftly informing us of the basics of the political chaos that surrounds Amin's life in both Afghanistan and Russia. There's an immense weight he carries, an almost constant fear of being removed, his home being taken away, a sudden yank back to a life of violence and uncertainty. There's also an unimaginable burden, a feeling that he must always prove his worth, a responsibility to his family to succeed, an obsession with his career that we see causing tensions in his relationship.

Flee is a remarkably humanising and complex film, expanding and expounding the kind of story that's too easily simplified. Rasmussen has created a loving and unsparing tribute to his friend, a brave survivor whose story I'll find impossible to forget.



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




Phoenix Group of Photographers

It's early September 2022, a Monday evening and the members of the Phoenix Group of Photographers have settled into their seats at the West Monkton Village Hall ready to be treated to a presentation by local photographer Pauline Rook.

Pauline is a Somerset based photographer and her presentation was about a photography commission she has been working on for the last twenty years. She was asked by the former Countryside Agency to produce a set of images documenting the lives of people living and working on the Blackdown Hills. She referred to her photographic influences, her background in farming and how she brought the two passions together. Her portraits and landscapes are mainly monochrome and showed the rapport she built with the people she photographed. It's a beautiful visual document of 'a way of life' hidden amongst the hills and a fantastic way to kick off our new season.

David Beer (Programme Secretary) has excelled in producing a diverse and interesting programme this season consisting of local and not-so-local photographers who attend and speak about their work either via Zoom or in person at the hall. We are fortunate to have members who offer to present insightful talks on a variety of topics, their areas of interest and inspirations. Amongst the varied programme of talks there was Tommy Hatwell. He enthralled all present with his presentation 'Around the World and Back Again'. Via Zoom he explained how he combines his love of travel and photography to capture the story behind his portraits. Although his photographic style

is very different to Pauline's, his work also emphasises the importance of spending time with the people you photograph.

Olivier Barjolle told us about his introduction to vintage Polaroid cameras when young, and how this contributed to his 'alternative processing' style of photography. He explained that the emulsion on old Polaroid film he used with these cameras were often well past their best. The spent emulsions had dried out in places; parts of the image discoloured and unexpected patterns appeared on the finished print. Some photographers would have been disheartened by the results but for Olivier the images created were interesting and evocative. What was seen as a 'happy accident' now forms the basis of Olivier's style.

Our most recent speaker was JP Stones talking live from the USA. He has spent the last 5 years living and working in Mexico photographing the indigenous Huichol people in their community, embracing their Mexican

heritage, the myths and folklore and telling their story. He produces incredible cinematic imagery explaining how the skills and set ups can be utilised to any photographic project. As well as talks we also have practical evenings and print critiques. Photography can be an expensive pastime so our 'Portrait', 'Playing with Light' and 'Still Life' evenings allow members to try different styles of photography, uninhibited and at no expense to themselves. Print/digital critiques are a way to get feedback on the images our photographers produce. Laura Pearce LRPS was asked to critique printed images produced by members. As a professional photographer and judge her honest assessment of our work was invaluable and motivating.

Following a successful exhibition at Taunton Library last September we are currently exhibiting at the Tacchi-Morris Arts Centre until 24th April 2023.
