Did you know there is a beautiful Grade 1 continue to provide a place for quiet reflection, and listed building dating from Saxon times in West Monkton?

Of course you did - it's the church at West Monkton - St Augustines.

Did you also know that serious works need to be undertaken to preserve the structure of the building and keep it open?

Our overall plan is to restore and future proof the building and re-order the interior to allow more use of the building by more members of the community.

Our Parish is large and scattered and we hope the residents of Bathpool, Monkton Heathfield, West Monkton and the smaller settlements of Goosenford, Coome and Burlinch will come to see the building as a vibrant centre of activities of benefit to all the community.

To keep the building open and thriving we need to make it available for everyone not just for Church Services, although of course they will continue. The big picture is daunting – so we are going to try and achieve our goals by delivering a number of (slightly) smaller projects, as explained below. For each project a Faculty is required (permission to do the work from the Diocese), and will be supported by grant applications to relevant and appropriate bodies.

#### The Lady Chapel

The Lady Chapel was added to St Augustine's in the major refurbishments that took place in 1883. Known as The Chapel of St Mary and St Margaret, the eastern end of the South Aisle was built in 1883 when a lot of other alterations also took place in the church. The work was done so beautifully that the old and new match almost perfectly. As recently as 1966, this space was turned into a side chapel and on May 26th 1966 it was dedicated to St Mary and St Margaret of Antioch. These saints were chosen to commemorate two little Chantry Chapels in the parish that had been destroyed between 1547 and 1553.

Periodically, during heavy rain, visitors to the Church will see there are a number of strategically placed buckets in the Lady Chapel to catch the water leaking from the roof. A temporary repair has been effected by volunteers who have given generously of their time and knowledge, but the roof of the Lady Chapel needs to be replaced. Three quotes have been obtained for the necessary work, all in the region of £20-30 thousand pounds (excluding VAT). A grant application is being prepared.

In order to help make this beautiful Grade 1 listed building as accessible to as many residents of the Parish as possible, it is anticipated that when the roof is watertight once more, further development of the Lady Chapel into a multi-use space would be useful. It would enable it to be screened off or otherwise separated from the rest of the Church's interior to

additionally, to provide a place where small groups could meet. This could be heated separately without needing to heat the entire interior of the church, which is very expensive.

The spread-out nature of the Parish of West Monkton means that meeting venues are also widely spread and a meeting venue in West Monkton Village would make meetings easier for those living in the northern part of the Parish.

#### The Gray Window Panels

The four painted window panels produced by Thomas Gray & Sons in 1821 were originally installed in the sanctuary East Window in 1827 but moved to the West Window during the Victorian restorations of 1883. The painted windows are unique using a technique developed to fuse enamel paints onto large glass panels. There is no lead work. Sadly they were damaged in the storms of 1987 and much of the glass fell to the ground. The remaining window panels were believed to be beyond repair and the glass was sold. In 2020 the Church was contacted with an offer to return two of the previous 4 panels of glass, which had been restored and were held in private collection. The gift was made on the understanding that these unique windows would be displayed again in St Augustine's. We now need to restore this church history and display these unique panels in light boxes as near as possible to their original placement near the West Window. The two returned panels show Our Lord's Ascension and Our Lord wearing his Crown of Thorns with bound hands and holding a white wand.

#### Further projects which need attention **Church heating:**

There is also a need for several other parts of the building to be upgraded, namely the church heating system which is over 30 years old, and is now both unreliable and expensive to run. It has already cost us £1000 in repair bills this winter just to get it functioning. A modified zoned heating system would enable more economical heating of the occupied areas of the church.

#### Making space more accessible:

It is proposed that one or two pews at the front of the church might be removed. This would enable better use of the front of the church for members of the community to host more events. There is a similar case to be made for removing some of the pews at the rear of the Church. The pews were probably installed as part of the refurbishment of 1883.


#### Church Organ:

We also know that in the next few years the church organ pipes will need to be cleaned, and also some minor restorative work on the organ is required.

#### Cycle racks:

This project is under discussion, and funding is being sought.

#### Letter from Rev. Jim

"Can we make up our own vows?" The church doesn't have so much contact with wedding couples these days, but this used to be a relatively common question. I once had a pretty church close to a Christian fellowship that met in a school and we'd often get their weddings. One of their very earnest young men once asked if he could have the vows where the wife had to obey. I said, "We're the Church of England, not the Taliban". He decided to get married somewhere

But it is a real question as to whether prayers written by someone else and 'simply recited' in church are as meaningful as prayers from the heart. And in some ways, clearly not. But what the Church of England – and other 'liturgical' traditions offer is a form of words that might provide insight and dignity to important occasions.

In the wedding service, for example, couples say to each other

#### All that I am I give to you And all that I have I share with you

Short and full of power: the whole of the one to the whole of the other. Perhaps putting into a poetic form concepts we struggle to articulate for ourselves.

Funerals, state occasions, times of national coming together require more than what a local vicar might scribble on the back of an envelope. And while there is the danger of unthinking recitation, the liturgical forms remind us – in our highly personalized culture - that we are part of something bigger than ourselves, not only across space but through time.

All worship runs the risk of becoming mechanical. 'Free' worship often acquires a remarkable uniformity and blandness over time. So if, as a non-regular, people poke their nose into a parish church, they may not understand what is going on, but they should have the impression that something is going on. And maybe that is enough.






#### Gardening Corner **Failing Upwards**

Watching a plant die can be heartbreaking. particularly a much loved favourite that has expired after many years of stalwart service. But also, if it is a much desired specimen that you have lusted after for ages and finally tracked down or a treasure grown from seed, joyfully potted on up the sizes until finally it is ready to plant out. And so in the ground it goes, and it sits and seems to consider its options before starting to decline. Foliage may start to look drab or damaged, molluscs and aphids may scent weakness and attack and before you know it you have a few brown stems left.

You may try this several times with the same results and decide to stop throwing good money after bad and try something else instead. This maybe the right option in the end, but consider first experimenting with smaller plants. With many herbaceous plants, the cheaper cost of small plants allows you to try different positions in the garden to see where it prefers life. If you can then get that plant to self seed, the real magic happens, with volunteer seedlings always healthier and happier than transplants.


I find this especially true in adverse conditions such as gravel gardens or dry soil baked by the sun. Small plants popped in in the autumn generally do better than larger plants planted in the spring. Sometimes of course this rule doesn't apply. You may find that the same small plants are just mollusc bait unless and until they are mature enough to grow through the damage. It can also be true of borderline hardy trees and shrubs where the stems or trunk need to be seasoned enough to withstand a cold winter. I've had this issue with Hoherias, which are tough when mature but can be defoliated or even killed by hard frosts when young.

In conclusion. It's complicated! But experimentation is part of the process of gardening and the failures are what makes it so exciting and rewarding when a plant that you have planted really reaches its potential.

The Robin, a regular winner of the RSPB Britain's favourite bird is, perhaps, our most familiar species. Many of us will have our 'own Robin.' As gardeners well know, Robins are great opportunists, following the digging spade and snatching disturbed worms and insects. They can easily be persuaded to take food from the hand, a habit that only increases their popularity. It comes, therefore, as a surprise to learn that the life of the average Robin is tough, short and often brutal.



The Robin hardly needs description, although most Christmas card artists could do with studying its plumage more closely. Simply put, Robins are warm brown above with an orange-red under parts extending above the beak and on to the sides of the neck. The 'red breast' has a subtle margin of light blue-grey and the rest of the undersides are dull white. Male and female are alike. Continental birds are greyer above, although this is difficult to see in the

field. Newly fledged birds are warm speckled brown and don't acquire the red breast until late summer. The eye is large and dark, and Robins have a distinctive habit of bobbing and

cocking their tail on landing.

Robins are one of the few birds doing well here and can be found throughout Britain and Ireland in suitable habitat. The manner in which they have adapted and exploited us has undoubtedly helped. Although confiding here, continental Robins are shy, wary woodland birds often difficult to find. Some of these arrive here in autumn and their different behaviour is often a clue to their origin.

They are good songsters and, unlike most birds, sing throughout the year although the melody changes subtly with season. They also sing at night, particularly under street lighting, and so are often

confused with Nightingales, although the song of the latter is in a different league. When alarmed or annoyed they emit loud 'tick' calls, and also have a quiet squeaky note, usually given from within cover. Song has an important purpose and, unusually, both males and females, sing to establish territories in autumn and to attract mates in spring. Should singing fail to deter an interloper then birds adopt an aggressive attitude, prominently displaying the red breast. If neither backs down a fight is inevitable. As hinted at, these skirmishes are often brutal and can even end in death for the loser and injury for the victor. Fortunately such escalation is rare. Should you see two Robins together in late winter they are invariably a pair, although days earlier they may have been bitter rivals.

Like most small birds the majority of Robins rarely live longer than two years, although one individual managed an incredible nineteen. Severe winter weather and prolonged frost kills many Robins but the majority fall to predation. The domestic cat is by far the greatest threat, particularly as Robins forage mostly on the ground. Fortunately for the species, Robins are prolific breeders, and a pair can raise fifteen young in a season. Even if only one or two survive their first year this is enough to maintain the population.

Although generally conspicuous, Robins are secretive breeders. Woodland nests are almost impossible to find and are difficult enough to locate in gardens. Gardeners are often unaware of a nest in a potting

shed or hidden away in some garden recess, and incubating females will sit very tight. Four to six eggs are laid in a neat little nest of moss and other vegetation often lined with hair. The eggs hatch in around thirteen

days and the chicks are fed by both parents for another fortnight before fledging. The male continues feeding for a while as the female lays another clutch. On fledging the youngsters disperse, but remain within the territory until late July when the parents themselves moult.

After that it is every Robin for itself. The pressure is on for seasoned adults and yearlings to locate and defend a suitable territory and a successful outcome is literally a matter of life or death. Should an established territory holder die the patch will be speedily occupied by another, sometimes within hours. It follows naturally from all this that your garden Robin will be a series of different birds during the course of a year. This hardly matters though. I for one am delighted to have them in my garden despite their pugilistic habits. Brian Hill

Greetings dear friends!

I found the text in 2 Kings 4:1-7 very comforting and encouraging.

A Drop of Oil in God's Hands is much evidence on several levels that there are at least two major tasks in our life. The first task is to build a strong "container" or identity; the second is to find the contents "faith and trust in God" that the container was meant to hold.

"Elisha said, 'Go around and ask all your neighbours for empty jars. Don't ask for just a few" (2 Kings 4:3).

When a situation seems impossible, we must remember that nothing is impossible for God. In trying times, we have an opportunity to flex our faith and lean into His supernatural power. God will provide. We just need to trust Him.

Second Kings 4 tells us about a widow who was all out of options. The woman's deceased husband had left behind a debt, and his creditor was on his way to collect. She was facing shame and degradation and the loss of her sons—and then she remembered the promises of God.

The widow's husband had been faithful to God, and as the head of his household, he had led his family to trust and obey the Lord. This poor woman knew God had promised to care for the righteous and provide for their needs. So, when she approached Elisha, seeking God's help, she knew her situation mattered to God. She placed her faith not in her good works or in the faithfulness of her husband, but squarely in the God who keeps His promises. She also displayed confidence in God's provision. When Elisha asked her what she had in her house as a starting point, she replied, "Your servant has nothing here at all," but then she thought for a moment more and remembered she did have something—"a small jar of olive oil" (2 Kings 4:2). The little bit of oil at the bottom of a tiny jar really was nothing in comparison to the size of her debt, yet she offered it to the Lord, knowing that in His hands it could be enough.

Finally, this widow maximized her capacity for blessing. Elisha told her to borrow jars and containers from her neighbours—and not just a few. So, she asked for as many as her neighbours could spare, and God blessed her accordingly. The oil in that small jar of hers filled all the containers, stopping only when the last was topped off. She

prepared for a large blessing, and that's exactly what she received.

As the world around you grows dark, God is still faithful. Now is the time to expand your capacity to receive. Don't be content with just a few jarsexpect great things from the Lord. He is your loving Father who is supernaturally at work in your life for your good and for the blessing of those around you. It is very important to know what is coming and being offered to all of us. Prayer: Lord, you are so faithful. Your blessings are overwhelming. You fill my cup to overflowing. Help me to see how You are at work in my life. May I have eyes to see Your goodness and confidence that You are able and willing to bless me as Your child. I pray in the name of Jesus. Amen.

Our Community Quiz nights at the Tacchi Morris are extremely popular and always fully booked. Andy Derry our quizmaster prepares the monthly quiz with a range of rounds from Geography,

Music to food and drink and TV. The quiz is free but you will need to book through the Tacchi Morris box office but will need to get in early to get a table. We do ask for a small donation on the night for the second team's cash prize. The team who take 1st prize get tickets to see one of the latest shows at the Tacchi Morris. ### What WMPC has achieved in 2022/23 Our Environment

Worked towards making the parish of West Monkton more carbon neutral by 2030 by:

- Enabling the planting of trees in the parish. 100 trees, 25 specimen trees and 700 shrubs (in the Forest School area) have been planted in Maidenbrook Country Park (MCP) during 2022/23. Nearly 4000 trees have been planted so far at the MCP. 190 trees were also planted in the Monkton Heathfield phase 1 development and 80 Cherry Trees were planted to created the Queen's Jubilee Platinum Walk along Dyers Brook.
- In partnership with Cheddon Fitzpaine Parish Council, delivered a wildlife pond and Forest School at MCP.
- Continued to deliver a hi-vis initiative to encourage children to cycle and walk to school safely. More than 100 hi-vis jackets have been given to school children so far.
- Explored locations for the provision of electric vehicle charging points in the Parish.
- Promoted public transport that is available in the Parish.
- Delivered seed swap events in the Parish in October 2022 and March 2023.
- Continued enquiries and conducted a survey about delivering a community transport scheme for the Parish.
- Commenced enquiries about providing electric bikes to loan to members of our Community.
- Provided grant funding for individuals and organisations for Climate Change projects based in the parish.
- Promoted recycling and reusing in the Parish by producing and sharing a 'Reduce, reuse, recycle what is available to me locally' document.
- Delivered a clothing collection for charity event.
- Delivered toy swap event.
- Delivered a Sunflower Growing Competition.
- Delivered two Farm Walks.

- Recruited in excess of 65 volunteers in the community to support community projects.







#### Cllr Stuart Haskins - Chairman's Report

It doesn't seem very long ago I was sat down writing the 2022 report and could not have ever imagined how the world could be changed by so many significant events that have affected us all in so many ways. You will see below that your individual Councillors and Clerks have all reported on the numerous events and activities they have been involved with but please forgive me if in my report I also comment on some of these same issues. 2022 will go down as a year of many changes and challenges for us all, of that I am sure. I feel it would be remiss of me to not firstly comment on the loss of Queen Elizabeth II. Whilst it may not have been a surprise to many, it still came as a shock the Nation and the World especially after it was only in June when we all came to gathered to celebrate Platinum Jubilee of Her Royal Highness. Closer to home the Parish Council (PC) saw our long-standing Clerk Mrs Patricia Cavill (Tricia) finally hang up her Parish Council high viz jacket to take a very well earned retirement. On behalf of all the Councillors, Clerks and myself I would once again like to thank Tricia for almost 18 years of devoted service to our Parish Community. Tricia's departure has seen Amy Shepherd take over many of Tricia's responsibilities and Kate Welsh increasing her hours and role as Assistant Clerk Community. Both bring a wealth of knowledge and experience to their roles and our community. Alongside our Clerks, Bethan Turner is also a vital member of the team providing back up for our many community schemes and functions such as the seed and plant swaps, toy swaps, planting competitions and the Parish Council Facebook page.





The securing of a lease on the Country Park (CP) was of great relief to both West Monkton and Cheddon Fitzpaine Parish Councils and now gives us confidence and a firm footing for the future of the Park and hopefully the further extension of the World War 1 Wood. Councillor Alan Hall has reported extensively of the progress achieved in the CP this year but I feel I need to add a word of thanks and appreciation to Alan for all his time and hard work this year. Working with his endless list of contacts and official bodies, plus an excellent team of volunteers organised by Joe Pearson, the Park continues to mature and develop into an asset and wildlife haven that will be there for generations to come. With the completion of the grant funded pond, planning is now in progress for stone walling at the rear of the pond and a small car park for the disabled visitors.

Working with our neighbouring PC Cheddon Fitzpaine, the CP became the centre point of our Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Funded by a Lottery Grant the manufacture of a beacon basket was commissioned from a local metal craftsman Mr Kevin Chedzoy. Foundations and the erection of the beacon was undertaken by a team of Councillors and a local farmer with his equipment on the highest point in the CP where it is now a permanent fixture for future occasions.

The lighting of the beacon on June 2nd was watched and supported by over 600 of our communities and was visible from many parts of Somerset. This was then followed on the Saturday by a Party in the Park where children played games and ate hotdogs and burgers whilst the parents had a drink and listened to the Military Wives choir sing. This was the first event of this nature to be organised by the PC's in the CP and was a steep learning curve for those involved. I think it's fair to say many useful lessons were learnt for future events. A big thankyou goes to all the Volunteers that helped make these events a success both before and on the days.

On a not so happy note, the Forest School building unfortunately continues to be vandalised by mindless individuals and is once again now in need of further work and repairs.

As we all know, the War in Ukraine has affected our lives in ways unimagined at this time last year and has added to the cost-of-living crisis. Coincidentally it was around this time last year that the PC started to investigate the Community Fridge idea as part of our Climate Change Action Plan to reduce waste. As most people now know, food that is before its use before date and after best before dates or is surplus from local food outlets is offered to the fridge where anyone wanting it can collect is at no cost and thus reducing food waste and stopping food going to landfill. Taking up the challenge, our Assistant Clerk Community Kate Welsh investigated the idea and following a visit to Frome to see their Community Fridge put together a grant application to fund ours. Soon we had a shed, a fridge and heaps of good will and enthusiasm to not only erect the shed but more importantly, volunteers from the community to clean, re stock and generally help run the initiative. So, a huge thank you must go our Assistant Clerk Community Kate Welsh and all the Volunteers that helped get this project off the ground and who now keep it running so well.

Housing Development in our Parish has continued this year with the completion of Stage 2 of the Hartnells Farm development. Whilst this development is not yet complete, i.e. stage 3, the works this year in connection with the development have caused a significant disruption to our residents, particularly in Richards Crescent whilst sewer works were undertaken. Hopefully there will be no further works required when the 3rd and final stage is constructed at some point in the future. A major issue for the community last year was the continued closure of the Creech Castle Junction for improvements. This finally came to an end in September but unfortunately we have not seen the decrease in traffic levels through Monkton Heathfield that we had hoped for. PC discussions with SCC Highways are ongoing about future options to reduce through traffic on the former A3259 but I can confirm that the 7.5 tonne weight restriction and the 20mph speed restriction are being made permanent from the spring of this year. The PC purchased our own SID (Speed Indication Device) which is has been deployed around our Parish at sites agreed with SCC Highways. This device is giving us real data about traffic flows and speeds which we hope will be of use in the future.

Activities at Britton Ash Community Hall (BACH) have continued with ever increasing support and participation from the community. Seed and plant swaps, stay and play group, community café, Warm Hub are just a few of the many things





regularly taking place. Councillor Paul Ellison with Kate, our Assistant Clerk Community continue to develop ideas that are really making positive steps towards building a single community that benefits from interaction and inclusivity.

Facilities at the BACH have been further developed and improved this year with the installation of air conditioning in the Activity Hall and a hearing loop to the Committee room. These are unique selling points and make the facility the first choice for many groups arranging meetings and activities. In addition to this a storage container has been bought and positioned in the car park thus releasing valuable storage space inside the building.

Outside, the BACH Councillor Paul Ellison has made great progress with the Community Garden Project. Whilst not a big garden at present, it is proving to be worthwhile and enjoyable to those participating and we are hopeful that this coming year will see further expansion of this project as the PC continues its search for land for Allotments.

As I have already said the PC is committed to developing the community and bringing people together. Working with the Tacchi Morris Centre Quiz Nights and Music night have been arranged and been very well supported and give us confidence that other functions will be supported. Having declared a Climate and Ecological Emergency in December 2019, the PC continues to look for ways and opportunities to improve the environment and our community against the effects of global warming. To reduce rainwater run-off speed from the lower Quantock Hills and working with SCC, the Local Lead Flood Authority and FWAG, a series of leaky dams have been installed on Allens Brook and during a recent heavy rainfall period proved to be very successful in slowing the flow to parts of our Parish that are vulnerable to flooding i.e. Bathpool area. Planting of trees continues to be high on our list of actions. Over the past year the PC has planted over 200 trees plus the cherry trees in our Platinum

Walk avenue. Keeping them alive last year was quite a challenge with the very dry period we had but working with volunteers it looks as if our efforts to keep the new trees alive was successful. Thank you to all those who helped in the weekly watering party.

The updated Neighbourhood Plan (NP) was adopted following the referendum. The updated plan will continue to be important for all future building developments in our Parish and looking ahead to this year it's clear it will once again be a busy one for your Councillors. Our ongoing engagement with the Developers of MH2, the Planning Authority and Creech St Michel PC amongst others will we hope, contribute to flagship "Garden Town" development. Plans are already being drawn up for the Coronation celebrations in the CP and we hope to see you all there for a really fun day.

Other projects which are in the planning stage are a community transport scheme and an emergency contingency plan. Working with the EA we also hope to have our own permanent water pump installed at Bathpool on the Old River Tone. Finally I would like to give a big vote of thanks to one and all of the Councillors Clerks and Volunteers give up their time and who turn up when the call goes out. Without this support it would not

be possible to deliver all the initiatives. projects and functions in our Parish that go to make it such a busy community.

#### The Maypole A story for our younger readers.

Not so very many years ago, most villages, towns and city parks had a maypole. This was not displayed year round but assembled in the days and weeks leading up to the first day of May- May Day, when traditionally, from at least as far back as the time of the Celts, the first day of Summer was marked with a day off work, festivities, eating and drinking, music- and dancing. Young men and women, or children would dance around a "pole" decorated with summer leaves and flowers. This stems from our ancestors worshipping trees as spirits. Henry VIII and Oliver Cromwell both banned the festival but it returned in 1660 when Charles II reinstated it in style, erecting a large maypole in the centre of London, which stood for over 50 years. Many maypoles still stand year-round across the U.K. and May Day has been a Bank Holiday since 1978. Nearby Thurloxton's pub is called "The Maypole".

The village school children had all been practising their maypole dancing. Bright coloured ribbons were tied to the top of the pole-one per child, sixteen in all- and, used in certain dances, created colourful patterns on the tree. middle class, from a beating, the sailor Martin Eden is invited to the boy's family home. Here he meets Elena, Arturo's beautiful sister, and falls in love with her at first sight. The cultured and refined young woman becomes not only the object of Martin's affections but also a symbol of the social status he aspires to achieve. At the cost of enormous efforts and



overcoming the obstacles represented by his humble origin, Martin pursues the dream of becoming a writer. Under the influence of the elderly intellectual Russ Brissenden, he gets involved in socialist circles, bringing him into conflict with Elena and her bourgeois

The film traces Martin's love affair with the pursuit of individual advancement. Like capitalism, it's seductive. If writing is a democratic art and social leveller, Marcello indicts the celebrity author as a sellout, steamrolling their way to success. By the time Martin gets there, in the film's third act, he's lost everything else

The terrible loneliness of success is the subject of this absorbing movie, equal in some strange way to the loneliness of failure; it's also about the secret and shameful feeling that failure is the one truthful state of being, which the successful person has had to renounce. Martin Eden is also about capitalism and enterprise and the great 20th-century promise that hard work and an audacious gamble on a certain career path at the start of one's life can carry anyone, however lowly born, on to riches. And more importantly, it is about the dizzying promise that the mass communication made possible by commerce will make art itself lucrative: that actually writing novels, capturing the imagination of millions, could exalt you to heroic celebrity.


**Ninjababy** 2021 Comedy/Drama 1 **Norway** hour 43 minutes

Astronaut, beer-taster, comic artist – these are just some of the things Rakel aspires to be. Mother is not on the list, so it's a shock when the 23-year-old graphic design dropout (Kristine Kujath Thorp) discovers she is

six-and-a-half months pregnant. According to her doctor, not everyone gets the belly. Rakel doodles her unborn baby wearing a Zorro mask, nicknaming it Ninjababy after its stealthy arrival. Directed by the Norwegian film-maker Yngvild Sve Flikke and based on Inga Sætre's graphic novel Fallteknikk, this witty comedy is interspersed with Sætre's rude, funny, David Shrigley-esque animations. Any tweeness is tempered by the film's raunchy sense of humour and frank attitude towards poo, piss and periods.

The film is less a romcom than it is a coming-ofage movie about slacker Rakel finally being forced to grow up. What's subversive is her ambivalence about motherhood, unchanged even after she aives birth.

This hilarious and sneakily brilliant comedy from Norway begins like half a dozen unwantedpregnancy movies you might already have seen. Rakel is a 23-year-old graphic design dropout who has not remotely got her life together yet. On paper, some of this sounds irritatingly quirky, but it's a film that really offers an honest look at a woman's life, from clumsy sex to Rakel's joggers that 57 washes ago might have held some shape. There's real insight and clarity in Thorp's performance too – likable and warm, without trying desperately hard.

#### Microsoft's Free Storage Debacle...

Its not often I'm flummoxed by utter stupidity in the IT world. Especially when it is from one of the leading companies like Microsoft (MS).

Do you have a free Hotmail, Outlook or Live.com email address? You are impacted by this.

Starting 1st Feb 2023, MS introduced a new policy over storage. Here we go. For as long as I can recall you were given 15Gb free space for your free email address. Then, if you use it (not everyone does) you also had a separate free 5Gb OneDrive allowance. Many people use free email and, like Gmail, Yahoo & Apple iCloud, Microsoft have offered a



free service called Hotmail, then renamed to Outlook (with side dalliance into Live.com) email addresses for years. It was all so easy. Not now.

So, the policy change is you now have, errr, 15Gb free space for email! Except when that email has attachments, like photos & documents.

Your attachments are stored in the 15Gb allowance, as before, but ALSO the attachments (only) now also fill up your 5Gb OneDrive space. The above graph, taken from a real Microsoft account with free email, shows the stupidity in full force. The email of this account owner has only used 30% or so of the 15Gb email space bottom graph. Great! Except, the attachments embedded on those emails have filled up the 5Gb free OneDrive allowance, top graph, because the user is also using a bit of space for OneDrive.

So, MS email users are now suddenly getting storage warning messages on their Hotmail/Outlook screens. MS are warning that unless the issue is "fixed" by the user then email may stop working. Guess what? They have a solution to this "problem" you now have. Buy more storage! In other words, sign up to something like Microsoft 365 Personal, for £60/year. The problem will go away! Your 5Gb limited OneDrive space magically grows 200x, to 1Tb (or 1000Gb).

So, to be clear. You still have 15Gb free email space. Except for any emails that have attachments. Those attachments fill up the other 5Gb space you probably didn't even knew you had, and if you keep all your emails, you almost certainly now have an issue. This is so clearly a drive by MS to stop people using free email. They can claim you have 15Gb for free, but in practical terms it is now 5Gb, seeing as just about every single email has attachments - even if it is no more than a logo of a company who has sent you an email. But the confusion over two disparate 'storage allowances' is just utter stupidity. At least Gmail & Apple have one storage allowance for their combined free service offerings. Why have MS confused it by overlapping two?







#### The £2 Bus Fare Extended Until The End Of June

The Somerset Bus Partnership has welcomed the Government's decision to provide an additional £75 million. This will enable bus operators to continue to cap their single adult bus fares at £2. The £2 flat fare introduced in January is now set to continue through to the end of June. Bus users in Somerset will be able to continue to travel on most bus routes in the county and beyond for just £2.

The previous average price of a single fare for a 3-

mile journey was around £2.80, meaning that the new fare will mean a saving of about a third on the price every time vou travel. It's worth remembering that this initiative applies to crossboundary services, which means you can travel for example from Taunton to



Minehead or Taunton to Dulverton for just £2. It's hoped this will persuade even more people to travel by bus, whether that's for work, education, shopping or medical treatments. Millions of people across England will be saving money just at a time when many households are suffering from the rising cost of living.

The 13 operators involved in the scheme are: ATWEST, Bakers Dolphin, Community Transport (South West) Ltd, Dartline, Faresaver Buses, First South West (Buses of Somerset), First West of England, Hatch Green Coaches, FromeBus, Libra Travel, Mendip Community Transport, Somerset County Council and South West Coaches. In addition, Somerset County Council has introduced within Taunton a special £1 single/ £2 return bus fare. Plus, there are new night time bus services with the last bus services leaving the towns and villages covered by the scheme will run between 10pm and 11.15pm.

The bus routes that will have a night service are: 1: Taunton to Priorswood/Musgrove Park/Silk Mills Park and Ride

21: Bridgwater to Taunton (Bridgwater Bus Station to Musgrove Park)

22: Wellington to Taunton

28: Minehead to Taunton (including Cotford St Luke and Norton Fitzwarren)

30: Chard to Taunton

This is funded by Somerset's successful bid for Government money through its Bus Service Improvement Plan. Somerset Bus Partnership welcomes this further initiative and is encouraging Somerset to bid for further funding so this urban flat fare can be extended to other Somerset towns. Somerset County Council and the Somerset Bus Partnership have launched the 'BUS IT' campaign to promote bus travel.

Somerset Bus Partnership's Co-Chair, Peter Travis, said, "Bus usage had declined in Somerset during the previous decade, and even more so during the pandemic. So initiatives like the £2 flat fare are needed to boost passenger levels. Encouraging people to choose buses over cars is really important because it also helps reduce our carbon emissions. Transport accounts for nearly half of our carbon emissions in Somerset. Somerset Bus Partnership will therefore be continuing to work with Somerset County Council to encourage greater bus usage."
