



Somerset Birds

The Goldcrest may have pipped the Wren to the crown of Britain's smallest bird but this is only by a matter of centimetres, and the Wren has bags of character that the Goldcrest cannot match. You may struggle to see a Goldcrest, but everyone knows the Wren, a tiny bird once so famous it appeared on the obverse side of the farthing, a coin I'm old enough to remember. There are many small, confusing brown birds but the almost permanently cocked tail of the Wren is an instant giveaway.

One reason the Wren is so familiar is its abundance, due to its catholic taste in habitat. They can be found almost anywhere, from small gardens, hedgerows and copses, to larger woods and even treeless mountains and moorland. It is among the most common of our smaller songbirds. Although not particularly shy, its feeding habits can make it difficult to see, but its song, among the loudest of our native birds, is remarkable and draws attention, it also has an equally loud scolding ticking call, usually when alarmed. Generally it is a successful species, with a British population exceeding eight million, with over two million in Ireland. It occurs throughout Europe, where it is a little more difficult to see, and Asia, and is one of the few 'British' birds with a strong population in North America, where it is known as the Winter Wren, to distinguish it from similar species there. Its wide distribution means there are several subspecies, and the Scottish islands have some that are subtly different in appearance. The Hebridean Wren, which is common throughout the largely treeless island of North Uist, is distinctly larger and more robust. DNA studies may, indeed, prove the Wren on the remote island of St Kilda to be an entirely separate species.



It is almost exclusively insectivorous, feeding on a wide variety of small invertebrates including beetles and, in particular spiders. The latter prey occasionally gets it into trouble. I once had to carefully release a bird entangled in a web from which it had attempted to extract the occupant. Reliance on insect prey means the population can crash in hard winters, dropping by

around 80%, but Wrens are prolific breeders and numbers soon recover.

Wrens nest early in the year, often in the first week of April. Pair bonds are formed and the male builds a number of almost complete cock's nests, one of which the female selects to complete and lines. Occasional nests within nest boxes may be open, but generally nests are domed, and often well hidden in various nooks and crannies. Built with moss and fine grasses, and usually lined with feathers they are often tucked away in the corners of sheds and outhouses.

Unused nests are often used as winter roosts, as are nest-boxes. Wrens don't mind sharing and one nest-box held over 60 birds during cold winter nights. Unnoticed, some will also roost in lofts and roof spaces benefiting from the warmth and safe haven we provide. Five or six eggs are usually laid, and these hatch within a fortnight. The chicks are fed for a further nineteen days, and after fledging are tended by the parents for another week or so. During this time they are vulnerable and rely on remaining camouflaged to escape danger. They are among the cutest of babies. Two or sometimes three broods are raised, and the male may support two females.

British birds do not move far but northern European birds do migrate southwards to escape severe weather, and some of these arrive here. It seems remarkable that such a tiny and apparently, frail, bird can cross the North Sea. So improbable did this seem it was actually suggested, in the early days of migration studies, that birds hitched a lift on the backs of larger birds!


Unlike many once familiar species now in steep decline it looks like the Wren continues to do well. Hopefully it will buck the current trend and continue to be a welcome sight in our gardens and during our woodland walks.

Letter from Rev. Jim

(The parishes of West Monkton, Kingston St Mary, Broomfield & Cheddon Fitzpaine)

It's only in recent years that the Church of England has lost its reputation for taking funerals well and without too much 'religion'. Five years ago, in an urban parish, we were regularly doing 100 - 150 funerals a year at the crem for families who wanted the thing done 'properly'.

Not only was it a huge privilege, but it meant that vicar and non-churchgoing parishioners were not strangers and sometimes, sadly, some families became very well-known. I came to know one teenage couple very well after they failed on at least three occasions to hold on to a pregnancy. But sometimes it was the unintended moments which lodged in the memory.

Once, after listening to a family's account of dad's life, as I was getting up to go, I commented on the paintings around the room. "Oh, dad did those," they said. They were really quite exceptional. There was a heavy pause.

"What?"

"Well, what we didn't say was that dad did 4 years for forgery."

I sat back down. Who knew how hard it was to burn £50,000 of counterfeit money on the living room fire as the police were coming up the drive? This time of year, we mark All Saints, All Souls and Remembrance Sunday. Most churches hold a service for those who wish to remember people who have died. We do. And at a time when so called 'direct cremations' are becoming popular, people are not giving themselves a proper space to grieve or to remember with joy and thanksgiving. We had a service in West Monkton at the end of last month and we have another on Sunday 5th Nov in Broomfield at 4pm.

You are welcome to come along and remember. Even if your family funeral was not with us. Even if your family funeral was a long time ago. It is a time when the church is filled with a love that is almost tangible.







Like many rugby clubs up and down the country Taunton have a ladies' section. In mid September they played their first match of the season at Cullompton in 30 degree heat. Despite the heat both teams played with skill and determination. Cullompton have a very experienced ladies' team as opposed to Taunton who have several players who this time last year had never played the game. Although Cullompton won the match the highlight for Taunton ladies was when they showed their ability and power driving the opposition back over the try line for a great score. The massive smiles on the faces of the whole team at the end of the match showed how enjoyable the experience was.

At present the ladies' team is still in the development stage. It is made up of a mixture of differing abilities so there is no need for anybody thinking of giving rugby a go to worry about not being good enough. Everybody is welcome to give it a go and there will be lots of encouragement from this friendly group of all ages. The ladies train every Monday and Wednesday from 7pm until 8.30. To anybody uncertain as to whether rugby is for you I say-What have you got to lose. You will get plenty of exercise, get fitter, have some fun and probably make some new friends.



Annual parish meeting speakers








Your Maidenbrook Country Park and memorial Somerset Wood

It is time to give you up to-date information on Your Country Park, yes Your Country Park. To date it has been difficult to let you know the plans going forward with the 30 Acres that we jointly manage with Cheddon Fitzpaine and West Monkton Parish Councils with a 125 year lease.

With a group of volunteers 3,600 trees have been planted over 4 years as 18" whips. These are now between 10 and 12 ft tall, and situated on the right at the bottom of Yallands Hill.





Total planting 3,500 native trees

We have designed the area to give a space for relaxation enabling you to get freedom of space with clear views to the Blackdown and Quantock hills. A natural area for you and wildlife, for this reason we have installed a 40 M x 20 M pond to month we will have installed Chestnut fencing walling, then we can take down the safety fencing for you to enjoy this area.

A forest school has been constructed to give local schools and very young members of our community For discussions on uses you may want to put forward, a place to learn about the outdoors. The control of this area has been a challenge with some damage incurred and would welcome the chance to sit down Project lead Country Park & Somerset Wood

with the youth and establish their needs for social and events that gives them purpose.

We would welcome independent Forest School trained adults to work with us to enhance the experience. WE ARE WORKING WITH Somerset Wildlife to allow nature involvement.

We have planted out the perimeter of a Labyrinth for "MIND" mental wellbeing with 6 flowering Cherry trees kindly donated by Soroptimist International.

For this area we are looking for funding to get this completed, we have the bricks, just need funding for the construction.

As you may be aware events have been held within the park and we are encouraged by the response to give greater emphasis to this area for the community via our parish council community lead Kate. Once open we are looking at such events as Falconry displays and other demonstration events.


The aim is to open up fully the park on 8th June 2024 which follows an event on 6th June for the celebration of the 89th anniversary of the D-Day landings. These will be celebrated across Taunton but also involving ourselves with the lighting of the Beacon which we lit for the Queen's Jubilee. This Beacon is one of the registered 2,000 beacons around the UK. As part of the park is the Somerset Memorial Wood, which has the aim of planting a further 10,000 trees to give 1 tree for every service personnel who died in WW1 who came from Somerset. Dedication stones have been placed within this area for their remembrance and support stones from 40 Commando who have supported this endeavour from day one.



The longer term aims for the park are to install an orienteering course for the young, a natural world centre which will emphasise nature experience along with wild flower meadows.

There are far more aims longer term but we would need to expand the area to ensure we do not sacrifice which we have added 1,700 aqua plants. In the next the openness of the area. 





Floating away down the Photostream

The wonder of a young child, standing on a bridge and dropping crucially - not stay there. ing it come through and float away!

This analogy is apt in two ways concerning the changes Apple made to the My Photo Stream service, in July 2023. Firstly, Photo Stream - often misunderstood - was like a river, that car-



ried things in a one way direction. You take a picture with your iPhone. The photo stores on the iPhone but, if you used the My Photo Stream facility from Apple iCloud, the photo would also travel one way like a stick on a river, from the iPhone to, say, your iPad or Mac computer. It would pass through iCloud, but -

sticks in the river, running to the other side of the bridge and see- It was a simple and effective way of accumulating your digital photos, you take out and about, on your Apple (or if you could with the additional pain, Windows) computer.



However, in July 2023, Apple decided to drop 'My Photo Stream' into our metaphorical river, and let it float away downstream, never to be seen again. I had a deluge of calls from people saying 'Help, what do I do now?' You see, Photo Stream was free to use but didn't make Apple any money. Crucially, it meant people didn't have to use iCloud Photos - the parallel service that also transfers your images from one Apple device to another - with the key difference that photos are also stored in iCloud - a free but limited storage space service on the internet. Free, that is, until you hit 5Gb of space used. 'No worry', say Apple, you can have more iCloud space - eg. 10 or 25 times - if you pay £1 or £2.50 a month.

So, for many who I have helped, to keep wirelessly transferring photos from iPhone to Mac or iPad, they have had to start paying. The more cynical view sees Apple's decision to turn off Photo Stream as a way to massively increase revenue. Imagine £1 a month from, say 10 million people in the UK. Its a great business model to have. "Its only £1", 10 million times. Good news, however. To carry on transfering photos for free, simply plug in your charging cable from the iPhone into the back of the Mac.

Then, in the Mac Photos app, head to File and Import. Photos app will bring in all missing pictures from the iPhone, and store them like before. It is a bit more hassle, but it works for some to carry on, post My Photo Stream.



Christmas Loaf: Festive, fun - and vegan!

This is a splendid bread for those who find Christmas cake a bit too rich and heavy. Every slice should show the bright yellow of the marzipan, and the red of the glacé cherries. The amounts of fruit, etc, I've given, are merely my suggestions. Vary them as you will. If you aren't keen on marzipan, use (yellow) dried apricots - or tinned sliced peaches. And use any other glacé fruit you like. The idea is to create a colourful, festive appearance when the loaf is sliced.

Ingredients:

- 200g (or 1 mug) strong white flour
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 100g (1/2 mug) sultanas (or any dried fruit; chop larger fruit down to sultana size)
- 25g candied peel
- Any spices you like mixed spice, cinnamon,
- nutmeg, etc. to personal taste
- 1 dsp fresh yeast
- 125ml (or 1/3 mug) lukewarm water Good splash of olive oil (2-3 tbs?) (optional)

Plus:

50g golden marzipan

- 50g glacé cherries, halved (save 3 half cherries for decoration)
- Sugar glaze made with 1 tsp sugar and 1 dessertspoon boiling water



Method:

1. Place the flour, sugar, dried fruit, nuts, mixed peel and spices in a large mixing bowl. Mix to distribute the spices. Measure the water and stir in the fresh yeast. Place the flour and sugar into a mixing bowl and pour in the yeast liquid. Add the olive oil. Have a little water to hand to add if necessary, remember, it is better for your dough to be wetter (slack) rather than drier (tight).

2. Hold the bowl with one hand and begin to mix with the other. Use one hand to turn the bowl round, whilst the other hand begins to squeeze the mixture together. As it forms into a solid mass, keep turning it over and pressing it down to pick up the flour at the bottom of the bowl – but make sure it stays soft. Don't be afraid to add more water. When all the flour has been mixed in, wipe the bowl around with the dough, turn it out onto the worktop and begin to knead.

3. Knead by stretching the dough out, folding it over, stretching it out and so on and so forth. Do this until it becomes smooth and even. This shouldn't take very long.

4. Now roll the dough out into a circle about 20cm across, then shape the marzipan into a long rope, just smaller than the width of the dough. Place the marzipan across the middle of the dough and put the halves of glacé cherries along each side of the marzipan (saving 3 halved cherries for decorating the top). Add more cherries if you like.

5. Fold one side of the dough, towards you, over the marzipan and cherries, then fold it over once more, so that the seam is underneath. Tuck the ends underneath to stop the marzipan from leaking out. Place on a prepared baking sheet.

6. Using a pair of scissors, snip three cuts in a row in the top of the loaf for the half cherries. Gently, but firmly, insert a halved glacé cherry into the slits, tucking the edge of the cherry under the dough on each side (this stops them falling out as the bread rises).

7. Cover with a dry tea towel and leave until it has risen appreciably. To prevent it browning too fast cover it with baking parchment halfway through baking.

8. Bake for 25–30 minutes at 190C, 375F or gas mark 5.

9. Brush with a sugar glaze made from 1 rounded teaspoon of sugar and 2 of boiling water. Cool on a wire tray.

This will keep for a couple of days and it freezes very well.
