

As I write this in late November the temperature is below freezing and it is hard to imagine that any birds would be thinking of nesting, but as we move into January one of our familiar water birds, at least in Somerset, will be doing exactly that. The Grey Heron is a familiar feature of our waterways, and can be seen along our rivers and canals, even in town centres. It is a common bird throughout the Avalon Marshes. Until recently it was possible to say this bird can be confused with no other, but now we have a small but burgeoning population of Common Cranes in the County, a

little more care is needed, especially as 'Crane' is an old Somerset name for the Heron. In reality though, the Grey Heron is easily distinguished, and the Crane is confined to the levels.

Grey Herons are for most of the year solitary birds, but do congregate for breeding. Like Rooks they nest communally, and similarly build large stick nests in tall trees. We have a number of well-known heronries in Somerset, and one of the best and largest ones to visit is that at the RSPB Swell Wood reserve overlooking West Sedgemoor off the road between Fivehead and Curry Rivel. A purpose-built hide overlooks the heronry and is best visited in late spring when the adults are making regular flights to and from their feeding sites. The chicks, and indeed the adults, are noisy and



time doing so. Generally, three or four eggs are laid in early

February and take a month to hatch. Fed by both parents with a diet of regurgitated fish, the chicks can remain in the nest for as long as 55 days.

They are fed by the adults for a further two weeks

or so, and then have the difficult task of fending for

themselves. Not all are successful. Grey Herons are patient fishermen. At times they will stalk their prey and can be seen in cut fields doing so, particularly when voles and frogs are abundant, but their usual tactic is to find a convenient waterside spot and wait motionless, eyes fixed on any movement beneath. A passing fish is captured with a swift downward strike and

manoeuvred head first for swallowing. Surprisingly large fish are taken in this way. Food is not confined to fish however, and rodents the size of rats, grass snakes and other reptiles are also eaten. Birds as large as Moorhens that stray too close have been recorded as victims, seized, drowned and swallowed. Unwary ducklings are regularly plucked from the water.

Until recently Herons have had their heronries to themselves, although they are known to share sites amicably with Rooks. In the last thirty years or so, however, things have changed dramatically. Little Egrets, vary rare until the turn of the century, are now established throughout the British Isles, and also nest communally. They too have taken to established heronries although, it seems, without conflict. Even more recently, the Cattle Egret, which recently bred for the first time in Somerset, has also moved in. Little Egrets can be seen nesting in Swell Wood and Cattle Egrets might soon follow. The only problem this is likely to pose is to the nest recorders charged with censusing the heronries, a

A third white heron, the elegant Great White Egret, another recent arrival from the south-east is a potential competitor for the Grey Heron, but this lovely bird nests not in trees but in large



reed-beds surrounded by water. Nor do they appear to compete for prey, although their diets are similar. I have seen them fishing side by side though this is clearly not usual. Ham Wall RSPB reserve is a good place to see Grey Herons, Great White and Little Egrets, and if you are lucky, Cattle Egrets in the nearby fields. It is pleasing to report that this particularly family of birds is bucking the trend and doing well.

purchased in the Gift Shop on arrival. There is a very good restaurant -





### **Sports Pitches**


Following the acquisition of the Sports Pitch land adjacent to the Eastern Relief Road between the Canal roundabout and the Hardys Road roundabout from the Developer, a fenced dog walking area has now been assigned and a dog waste bin provided for dog walking. Groundworks will shortly get underway on the remainder of the land to add the required drainage and seed the pitches. ## Monkton Heathfield Phase 2 (To be known as Langaller Park) Planning Application

In December 2021 a Planning Application was made to the Local Planning Authority in respect of the MH2 development.

The details of that application are as follows: 14/21/0047/HYB Application for a Hybrid Planning application for Outline planning permission with all matters reserved, except for access related to the A38, for the second phase of the Monkton Heathfield development comprising of a residential and mixed use Garden Town Neighbourhood including up to 1210 No. dwellings, up to 4.83 hectares of land for strategic employment uses, 8 hectares of land for a through school, mixed use district centre. community facilities, green infrastructure, drainage works, land for a 600 No. space 'Bus and Ride' facility, relief road (EER2) and associated works and for full planning permission for the erection of 240 No. dwellings with access, including temporary access arrangements, and associated infrastructure works on land east of the A38, south of Walford Cross, Monkton Heathfield.

The application relates to the site outlined below:









Since the application was submitted the applicants / developers have been working up alternative plans and proposals. West Monkton Parish Council, jointly with Creech St Michael Parish Council, has engaged with the Developers, Somerset Council Highways and the Somerset Council Planning Officer trying to influence the plans and proposals as they were developed but unfortunately with limited success

Throughout the period of engagement, the Developers have consistently refused the Parish Councils permission to share the plans with our communities.

The Parish Councils' now understand that the finalised new plans and supporting information for the new planning application will be submitted to the Local Planning Authority during December 2023 and when they are they will also be available on the Somerset Council website via the link above, in the public domain where members of our communities will have the opportunity to view the updated proposal and put forward any representations they have.

The Parish Council would like to clarify its position that the plans, particularly in relation to the proposed highway infrastructure, have changed significantly since the original submission in December 2021, and that the Parish Council has, throughout its engagement with the Developers, voiced its concern and objections on this point in particular.

As soon as the plans and supporting information are submitted by the Developer, the Parish Council will be organising a consultation event, most probably in January, to gather your views on what is being proposed. Your views will then be reflected in the formal comments that the Parish Council makes in respect of the proposal.



### January 5th "The Eight Mountains"

Belgium/Italy 2022
Drama Cert: 12
2 hours 28 minutes
Belgian film-makers Felix van
Groeningen and Charlotte
Vandermeersch have adapted
the award-winning 2016 novel
by Italian author Paolo
Cognetti and have created a
deeply intelligent meditation on
our capacity for love, and how
it is shaped by the arbitrary,



irreversible experiences of childhood, and by our relationship with the landscape.

This rich and beautiful film is about the friendship between men who can't talk about their feelings and about winning and losing at the great game of life. It is set in the breathtaking and wonderfully photographed Italian Alpine valley of Aosta, which includes the slopes of Mont Blanc and the Matterhorn. But the "eight mountains" of the title refers to the eight highest peaks of Nepal: a mysterious symbol of worldly ambition and conquest.

This is a movie with air in its lungs and love in its heart. It is spacious and unhurried in its devotion to beauty and to what it means to be human. This film has mystery and passion, it climbs mountainous heights and rewards you with the opposite of vertigo: a sort of exaltation.

### January 26th 'Blue Caftan'

Morocco 2022 Drama Cert: 12 2 hours 3 minutes

A finely crafted Moroccan love story in which the secret of a tailor's homosexuality is woven into his married life in Maryam Touzani's gently observed drama.

Halim (Saleh Bakri) is more than a tailor. At the traditional shop in a Moroccan medina that he runs with his ailing wife Mina (Lubna Azabal), he works lovingly and painstakingly, hand-embroidering silks so exquisitely fine they are like wearing air. And in a way, this delicate, precise, time-consuming approach is mirrored in director Maryam Touzani's film-making, with its focus on tiny details, the fleeting glance, an almost imperceptible brush of skin against skin. It's a gentle piece of Arabiclanguage storytelling, one that softly, slowly enfolds the audience rather than propels them on a journey.



Halim, with his sad eyes and melodic, minor-key voice, loves his wife deeply, but the couple live with the secret of his homosexuality – something Mina has come to accept but that still generates an occasional stab of jealousy in her. When a new apprentice, Youssef (Ayoub Missioui), joins them, she is aware of the attraction between the two men; there is a sharp edge to her manner when she talks to Youssef. But the dynamic between the three subtly shifts over time. As Mina's health fails, she weaves Youssef into the fabric of her own present and her husband's future life.





### **New Year's Dav** Food traditions around the world

New Year's Day is meant for fresh starts, but in many countries it also means eating special foods that have some kind of symbolic meaning. As the new year arrives around the world, special cakes and breads abound, as do long noodles (representing long life), field peas (representing coins), herring (representing abundance) and pigs (representing good luck)! In southern states of USA they eat a dish called Hoppin' John, this is a dish of pork-flavored field peas or black-eyed peas (symbolizing coins) and rice, frequently served with collards or other cooked greens (as they're the color of money) and cornbread (the color of gold). The dish is said to bring good luck in the new year. The dish has its roots in African and West Indian traditions and was most likely brought over by slaves to North America.

A fairly new tradition is found in many parts of Spain, it is called Twelve Grapes. The people of Spain traditionally watch a broadcast from Puerta del Sol in Madrid, where revelers gather in front of the square's clock tower to ring in the New Year. At the stroke of midnight, those out in the square and those watching at homehey eat one grape for every toll of the clock bell. The custom began at the turn of the 20th century and was thought up by grape producers with a bumper crop!

Just before midnight on New Year's Eve, the Japanese eat soba noodles. The Toshikoshi soba, which

translates to a "year-crossing" buckwheat noodle dish, has lots of symbolism. The long noodle denotes the crossing from one year to the next. Since it's an easily cut noodle, it signifies a letting go of the past year's regrets—a cutting-off before the start the new year brings.

The tradition of a New Year's cake, often called King Cake, is one that is found around the world. The Greeks have the Vasilopita, the French the gateau or galette des rois. Mexicans have the Rosca de Reves and Bulgarians enjoy the banitsa.

**Kransekage**, meaning wreath cake, is a cake tower composed of many concentric rings of cake layered atop one another, and they are made for New Year's Eve and other special occasions in Denmark and Norway.

The cake is made using marzipan, often with a bottle of Aquavit in the center and can be decorated with ornaments, flags and crackers.

### Aye Aye, A.I.! Keeping an eye on you!

A.I. (or AI) It appears to have come out of nowhere in the last year. But what is it? AI means machines can do things that people can do with their brains. For example, AI can help computers talk, choose, fix, or make new things. Al is not one thing, but many different ways and tools to help machines do different things. Some of the ways are machine learning, deep learning, and natural language processing. Al is in many things we use every day, such as chatbots, music apps, maps, and voice helpers. Al can make our lives better, but it also has some problems and dangers we need to think about.



Now, cards on the table. I just used an Al computer program called ChatGPT to write the above text in this article, that is in italics. (Everything else is written by me, a real human!) Al, or Artificial Intelligence is a slightly

describe new types of computer programs that attempt to emulate aspects of how humans think. Some concepts have been emulated quite well whilst others, presently at least, leave a lot to be desired. One of the tools available for the everyone to try out is called ChatGPT - not exactly the funkiest brand name ever invented. But nonetheless, it is very easy to use. (If you want to try it yourself, go to the website bing.com and then click on the blue 'chat' icon). The idea with ChatGPT is that you ask real human-type questions. I posed this question: "Write me a 150-word summary on what AI is, for a nontechnical adult audience." The first response, whilst quite succinct, still had too much technical jargon in it - but it was the right length. So, I then wrote back to ChatGPT "Write me simpler version of the last answer". The result is what you see in Italics above. Quite impressive! You could search Google for something on AI but you would then need to rewrite it yourself - possible reading multiple sources. ChatGPT is attempting to do that interpreting and combining for you. However, Al Picture Drawing is, ahem, somewhat experimental still. I asked ChatGPT "Draw me a simple diagram that represents AI in use." The first result wasn't what I wanted. So I said "Redraw the picture but with cartoon characters, to depict what AI is in 2023." Errr, the strange result is the image you see above! There are real concerns, of course, where this all leads. Worries over job losses, over reliance on machine-produced information that may be wrong, and on it goes. But Al is here, and already widely in use, and ChatGPT gives us early concerning term to insights into how it works.






### Gardening on the back page

Sitting watching the rain falling steadily, heavy grey skies straight overhead with no prospect of them moving for the rest of the day. A good day to catch up with seed orders maybe, or to plan a border re-jig, or even, for the first time ever, to get ahead of yourself and start your tax return?

Well, yes, all of those would be good but perhaps I can persuade you to pull on your water-proof jacket and wellington boots and to trudge out into the garden?

Looking at the garden in very wet weather can be instructive and can show you things you might otherwise struggle to see. The first thing is that it is immediately apparent where water sits and forms pools. These slight

depressions or differences in the underlying soil are barely visible to the naked eye, but water shows them up. Then, armed with the knowledge, you have options. Do you want to change the soil to stop the gathering of water by eliminating the depressions, or, better, let that specific micro-climate guide your planting, making sure you choose something that doesn't mind getting wet feet in winter and, perhaps, enjoys a bit more moisture in summer, such as a Phlox or Hemerocallis (day Lily) for example and avoiding any things that hate winter wet such as Mediterranean herbs such as Lavender or Rosemary.

Looking at the flow of water from the roofs and gutters also makes you aware of how much water is available for free. Diverting, even some of that water, into a pond or bog garden is a great idea for encouraging insect life and investing in a few water butts (the bigger the better) will give you off-mains access in dry times.
