

I see the farmer has just put a well-dressed mommet in his newly sown field. He will be glad to have heard a yaffle forecasting rain, although a colley is singing tunefully from the hedge. The storm-cock's nest is

empty for their young hatch early in the year. This lad has evidently been fishing but says that it's a poor year for elvers.

Back in the garden a dumbledore is still busy among the flowers but as it becomes dimpsy the first fluttermouse is on the wing and will



have caught numerous insects through the night. An urchin emerges from under bushes to search for its favourite diet of caterpillars. **Emmets** are scurrying home from all directions.

Our cat just occasionally catches a wont, she has patience to sit and wait her chance, but the creature's presence is easily traced across the lawn. The soil displaced is a gift for gardeners anyway. A reminder that one corner of this needs repair work with a small spine.

In the grass there is a gallitrap in a shady corner, but



West Monkton Church Projects – An Update!

Changes are afoot at Church - Read on to get up to date!

These proposals for change to our building fabric and services reflect our vision to fill the church with activities based on the needs of the community, run by the community for the community. Have you ever given this any thought?

Over the past twenty years the civil Parish of West Monkton has changed from small and semi-rural (about 1150 homes) to much larger including local hamlets to large urban extensions (about 4600 homes). In the same period, changes to the church community have not reflected population growth.

After much discussion and consultation some proposals are emerging, but to be

successfully delivered they need your engagement and support. Whilst previous surveys have shown a general agreement to go ahead in principle, it is important to stress that new ideas are emerging and being added to the melting pot. The purpose of this update is to share the general direction of travel and

point out some ideas for consideration.
Re-roofing the Lady Chapel – this roof has leaked for several years – however this project should be underway by the time you read this Then in no particular order the proposals are:-

 Space heating – new boiler – ours is elderly, unreliable and no longer efficient.

- Removal of pews at the rear of the church, maybe in several stages.
- Conservation work to Chancel Arch East Gable wall
- Enclosure of the Lady Chapel
- · Replacement sound system
- Placement of the Gray window panels Here's where we need your community spirit... These are all expensive projects, and it must be appreciated that once one of the projects is finished, the next one must begin - so the need for support in

terms of time, talents, fundraising and finance is long term. Please let us know if you can assist in

any way, no matter how small it may seem to you, we would love to see you. If everyone does a little, then the task seems less enormous and the gains to our Parish and community will be hugely beneficial. Taking part, making new friends and



being part of a project like this can bring its own rewards. It doesn't matter if you don't come to church, we want to deliver these projects so that the church building gets used to the benefit of all. We will be working on a business plan to be able to sustain the improvements and not leave the PCC in debt. It is important that the PCC should


events? We particularly need fundraisers. Or maybe your skill is in filling out application forms for grants - or can you help us to develop a business plan to support a larger grant application?

(The parishes of West Monkton, Kingston St Mary, Broomfield & **Cheddon Fitzpaine)**

In a previous job, the local primary

school came to visit the church and as they were all filing in and I was setting up at the front, a little voice in the front row said, "Look, Miss, it's Jesus". The teacher corrected him saying, "No, that's just the vicar". But the child insisted: "Not 'im! In the window behind". Plus one for traditional stained glass; minus one for vicar's self-

Our four churches in the Benefice are blessed with exceptional stained glass and they fulfil their task of educating us and enriching our worship. We can be informed by the stories they tell or just get lost in one particularly vibrant colour.

Churches come in many shapes and sizes – and styles. And it is a strength that within the Taunton Deanery (the 20 or so churches across the area) that we don't have far to travel to find a style which enriches our worship and helps us connect with God. This is a diversity which is worth preserving. At a time when corporate image in public life has a habit of gagging those who are 'offmessage', it is worth remembering that most people are not naturally corporate-minded and seek knowledge and truth in a variety of ways.

We all need to renew and refresh our vision – in faith, politics, education, health, business, music and the arts - in all walks of life. But things can only become 'traditional' because they work across time. Difficult as it may be to imagine, Bach will outlast Beyonce.

New and shiny doesn't have time to bed in and seep into our psyche. It isn't critiqued or assessed because we simply move on to the next new thing.

All our churches are constantly seeking ways to connect and interact with the wider public. Often it is through the public events like Remembrance, the private journeys through grief, the celebrations of new life and new relationships. On all these occasions, tradition and expectation have to work in conjunction with renewal and innovation.

But sometimes the stained glass and architecture can connect in ways that strategists can't imagine. And thank God for that.





My introduction to the Marcher Apple Network* came about because a member (Mrs Leitch, I think) was speaking to close the Society's fruit display at Kington Agricultural Showground** in 1999. Although tired towards the end of this summer day, I noticed her enthusiasm and ability to enthuse on the subject of fruit: also the interest she created in visitors around her regarding discoveries of unknown old trees.

Consequently, on returning to Somerset, I intended to send samples from branches of a certain 'top worked'*** apple tree planted by my great grandfather 150 years ago, and once part of a long ago orchard, but now at the edge of a garden. The aged hollow tree (even before my birth) had been a part of the garden's furniture as a living structure, and fondly called 'The Sheep's Nose'. Yet, as so often happens with the human mind, it was present more in the subconscious vista - because it has always stood there - and other events caused my resolve to be put on hold until gardening in late 2003 when I realised the tree's survival was suspect. Thinking of the guttering candle flickering brightly, or of an ailing lamb regaining vitality until expiring when the necromancer attends, samples were duly sent and later the professional voice of a Mr Davis informed me we were in with a chance of regenerating this old tree. Our tree died in 2005. Arriving at (Mrs Leitch's) house and garden, an experience in itself near Glasbury-on-Wye in 2006 I took possession of two healthy grafted trees. Other scions were thriving in Dolau-Hirion, a fruit tree nursery in Llandeilo. In future mature fruit would be available from another tree at Tredomen Court and analysis then taken.


In September 2023, Kingston St Mary Parish Council kindly forwarded a message from Dr. Stephen Ainsleigh Rice, a member of the Marcher Apple Network, enquiring if any 'Palfreys' existed in this Somerset village after a family visited their show display over twenty years ago. Well, as I am the last one standing, I contacted Ainsley, who is a person with that rare ability to portray wit and knowledge as though in the same room via e-mails! The apple tree in question, a mid-season cooker, was unique, having no previous DNA fingerprint. After deliberating partly because I did not want the name Taunton Fillbasket (also because 'Sheep's Snout' and 'Sheep's Head' already exist) a panel at the University of Reading approved the name 'Sheep's Nose of Kingston' to retain the location of origin. It now joins a database with over 5,000 other varieties (www.fruit.com).

To date we have the cider apple 'Kingston Black' and now the mid-season cooker 'Sheep's Nose of Kingston'. The mature fruit is round with a distinctive long nose, similar to the head of a Boarder Leicester Sheep. You can eat it raw picked from the tree's south side. The light colour and fluffy flesh can be used with the eater 'Charles Ross' or add whortleberries to the hot apples (with memories of the crust off clotted cream, sometimes clove or cinnamon, as many rural cooks did then). It is thought that in this area there are other unknown fruit trees to be discovered, so when reading this please inform others, even your neighbours.



Gardening Corner

Spring layer Cake


Some gardens take a while to get going, with borders and beds that are lush and verdant but lacking in flowers before May and June when the majority of perennials and shrubs do their thing. This leaves a huge gap in the growing season in early and mid spring that can be filled with the smaller plants that can be worked into the spaces between other plants that are early into growth, flowering before the bulk of garden plants get growing. They can then either disappear below ground or be sufficiently shade tolerant that they can lurk beneath the mass of summer growth from larger, later to the party plants.

Bulbs are an excellent way to do this but care is needed to select the right ones. I have seen many gardens full of daffodils that then smother the smaller plants around them with their voluminous leaf growth. So, I prefer to use narcissi naturalised in rough grass where they don't get in the way. Tulips can be a good option for intense dots of early colour but to be sure of them returning year on year you need a sunny, well-drained bed and to select good robust perennial variables such as 'Spring Green', 'Ballerina' and 'Queen of the Night'. Anemone blanda, the native wood anemone, is a good choice and is never badly behaved with its tidy foliage, the same goes for crocus species and, on damp soil, Snakes-head Fritillaries.

Outside of the world of bulbs, primulas (primroses, cowslips and oxlips) are excellent as is pulmonaria (Lungwort) available in shades of blues, white and pink, Brunnera and Ranunculus. I avoid spreaders like vinca (periwinkle) among other plants as it tends to swamp anything in the end!

Pigeons and Doves belong to a large family of birds with representatives worldwide, so it is puzzling that they receive so little attention from birders. As a broad distinction, 'pigeons' are the larger species, and 'doves' the smaller, more delicate, and in many respects the most attractive.

The Stock Dove is our largest dove and suffers by being superficially similar in appearance to the Feral or 'Town' Pigeon, with which all of us are familiar. The latter bird is itself descended from the wild Rock Dove, of which a very few can still be found on remote Scottish Islands. Stock Doves are gentle in appearance, a pale warm grey overall, with a lilaccoloured breast and a beautiful iridescent silvery-green

marking on the neck. They have been steadily increasing locally, and are not uncommon in West Monkton, although

they are rather shy. Unlike the larger, and more abundant Woodpigeon, they breed in holes in trees, old barns and ruined buildings. A good place to see them is at Lashpool Farm, east of Creech, on the opposite side of the canal. At least four pairs are resident there.

The Collared Dove is another attractive bird and a familiar one to most. It is pinkish grey overall, with dark wing tips and white edges to the tail. A dark marking on the side of the neck gives it its name. To some, its prolonged song is a little irritating, a repetitive 'coo coo cuk', often given from overhead wires. Reports of early cuckoos are usually down to this bird. The nest is a flimsy platform of thin twigs, usually in a tree, but sometimes on man-made structures like satellite dishes. Two eggs are laid and the birds breed throughout the year, compensating for this low clutch size.

In my view, the Turtle Dove, in many ways a cousin to the Collared Dove, is the most attractive, so much so it has found its way into literature and folklore. There are several references to it in the Old Testament. Very sadly it has decreased catastrophically in Britain and parts of Europe, largely down to its failure to adapt to intensive agriculture, although it is heavily hunted in southern Europe, through which it passes during its autumn migration. Its soporific purring song was once a familiar sound of the Somerset hedgerows in summer, but has not been heard here for many years. A very few still nest in Wiltshire, Dorset and Hampshire, and efforts are being made to revive its

fortunes in East Anglia. It is a more colourful bird than the Collared Dove, with gingery feathers on the wings and back, and a prominent black and white patch on

the neck side.

Outer Hebrides when we had a call from a neighbour about a strange bird in the garden. Usually they turn out to be a common species, but I am always grateful to receive such messages. In this instance it was approaching dusk and we were tempted to leave visiting till the morrow. It was fortunate that we didn't. The strange bird, perched on a fence, was clearly a dove but not a regular species. It only took us a moment or two to recognise it as an American Mourning Dove, a bird never recorded in Britain. Luckily the failing light was just good enough for me to take a poor photograph before darkness fell. Any 'first for Britain' receives stringent scrutiny from the British Birds Rarities Committee and this photo eased acceptance. Around 15 twitchers managed to cross to the island the following day but it was not seen again after mid-morning, despite much searching and its fate remained unknown. There have only been five records since.

was doubtless transported across the Atlantic by a deep low pressure system a few days earlier. I recall that we might have had the odd whisky to celebrate our great good fortune!

2024/25 Parish Council Budget and Precept Demand

After lots of discussion, the Parish Council budget for 2024/2025 has been approved and is available on the Parish Council website. Due to the financial

position of Somerset Council some non-statutory services that they previously provided will fall to the Parish Council to deliver going forward. This has meant that the Parish Council budget and precept demand has increased. The 2024/25 budget is £195725.00 and the precept demand has increased to £172995.00. For a Band D equivalent property this means an increase from £55.75 per year to £78.48 per year on the Parish Council element of your Council Tax bill.



Monkton Heathfield Phase 2 (To be known as **Langaller Park) Planning Application**

Public Consultation events were organised by West Monkton Parish Council and Creech St Michael Parish Council in February, the feedback received at these events will inform the Parish Council response to the planning application. Somerset Wood – Poppy of Honour Pavilion in 2018 as a national memorial to honour British and Commonwealth Servicemen and



Servicewomen listed as killed or missing in World War 1. The idea was spearheaded by Terry Williams who gained the support of volunteers across the world and sponsorship of local Honour memorial. The full story of the creation of the Poppy of Honour can be read on https://poppyofhonour.org.uk.

The Poppy of Honour Memorial incorporates 1,117,635 individual remembrance poppies inside its encasement. The number of poppies equates to the total of British and Commonwealth Servicemen and Servicewomen listed by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission as 'Killed In Action' or 'Missing In Action' together with those 'Shot at Dawn' then later pardoned and those who died from their wounds after the Armistice of the Great War. Each poppy has been hand-written with painstaking care to bear the Rank, Name and official Date of loss of a single individual.

The Memorial presents to view a giant, doublesided, red remembrance poppy mounted vertically onto a base constructed from three steel beams



welded together having a bifurcated extension at each end to make it free-standing. At the extremity

of each of the four bifurcation arms is a silhouette of a 'Tommy' in reverse-arms position with head bowed in respect and a cast-iron poppy made from British Artillery shell detonators fired during the Great War. The centre-piece display section is a hollow poppyshaped structure consisting of clear-glass elevations The Poppy of Honour (pictured below) was created to front and rear edge-bonded onto and separated by a narrow side ribbing made from 3mm rolled steel plate. Visible through each poppy-shaped, toughened safety glass display window are 5,500 of the inscribed poppies individually mounted on plywood backing sheets. The remaining 1,106,635 poppies are loosely encased in the cavity between the two plywood panels inside the hermetically sealed, gas-filled, glass and steel outer envelope.

The Poppy of Honour was initially unveiled at a poignant ceremony at Cale Park, Wincanton. Since then, The Poppy of Honour has visited 19 towns throughout the county. On Thursday 9th November 2023, the ownership of the Poppy of Honour was assigned to 'The People of the United Kingdom and Northern Ireland and all the other Realms and Territories of His Majesty King Charles III and all the Commonwealth Countries.' The ownership certificate states 'The Poppy of Honour Memorial Group are to be the Custodians of The Memorial in perpetuity and businesses to facilitate the creation of the Poppy of are responsible for its maintenance. The Custodians are entrusted to register The Memorial with the relevant authorities as a War Memorial. The Custodians are further to ensure that 'The Memorial



is installed in the Somerset Wood within Maidenbrook Country Park, Maidenbrook Lane, Cheddon Fitzpaine, Taunton, Somerset TA2 8JT for The People to view free of charge'.

As such the Parish Council applied for planning permission for an open pavilion within which to permanently house the Poppy of Honour, together with informative display boards to be built at Maidenbrook Country Park as illustrated here. Planning Permission has been obtained for the Pavilion and fundraising is now taking place to raise money to build the pavilion.





France 2021 Drama 1hr 27m Anyone who has ever broken into a sweaty, panicked run to make it in time for school pick-up will instantly get why the French Canadian director Eric Gravel has chosen to shoot this film about



motherhood frazzle as a gripping thriller. It's impossible to overstate just how sickeningly stressful this propulsive drama about suburban commuting manages to be. Gravel uses every tool at his disposal, matching the nervy, lurching camera with a galloping, tumbling electronic score. OK, I'll send you a message!

Remember the archaic days of email in the late 90s and early 2000s? You had to power up the PC, dial up the internet, wait for emails to download. And when they did there was no attaching photos of the holiday - just plain text messages. Thank goodness for our modern era when we can easily communicate with our mobile phones. Dramatic pause. "Is he for real?" I hear you say. ("I never got your message, when did you send it?" "Oh yesterday after we met." "Well, I haven't seen it.") The problem, in the 21st century is that we have too many ways to 'send that message' to one another. In the early 90s Text Messaging was invented. As a result texting (or 'SMS', if you want its official name) is on every single phone. In the Late 90s/early 2000s this worked well - you could send messages and it just arrived across all makes of phone. So, at that point, the world used email on the computer, and texting



But... then it all went crazy. Apple introduced the iPhone in 2007, and (somewhat quieter) Google launched Android, and the race to bring smart phones to the masses began.

And with it came multiple innovations 'to improve how we can communicate'. In no particular order, we ended up with Apple iMessage, WhatsApp, Facebook Messenger, Instagram Private Messaging, Telegram, Signal. Over in Windows PC land, we also had, originally, Skype (still around now by the way), but more modern ones like Teams. There is no longer any differentiation between 'mobile technologies' and 'PC technologies'. Then you have confusions like 'WhatsApp' needs a smart phone to activate, Skype doesn't. You need an Apple device for iMessage, but no good on Android phones and on it goes. So, its no wonder you haven't got any idea if someone messaged you. And even if you did see it, two weeks later you can't recall for the life of you which app it was via. Text? Whatsapp? Email? Messenger? Then there are contacts you have who 'don't do whatsapp' or whatever - so you have to remember to message them an alternative way than others.

Is there any hope to this mess? Well, I cautiously say 'Yes. Maybe.' on our pre smart phone era mobiles. A new messaging technology called RCS is on its way. Google already have implemented it on Android mobiles. The big news is that Apple are bringing it to the iPhone in 2024. This is a big deal - and means that your Texting app on your mobile will be able to do what WhatsApp does across iPhone & Android. The question is whether (Facebook-owned) WhatsApp has cornered the market. Is RCS too late to the table? When I find out the answer, I'll send you a message!

Taunton Rugby Club

Taunton Rugby Club are celebrating the achievement of one of their star players from last

season who was called up to the full England squad for the 2024 Six Nations championship, always one of the highlights of the season. The player in question, Immanuel Feyi-Waboso, joined Taunton on loan from Exeter Chiefs last season and helped transform Taunton's season to finish on a high and maintain their place in the third tier of English Rugby.

Immanuel started his rugby career at Wasps, then based at Coventry, and is studying to be a doctor. Whilst at Wasps he studied at Aston University but after Wasps went out of business he joined Exeter Chiefs even though that meant he had to give up his studies at Aston

and start again at Exeter. Now less than a year after donning the Taunton Titans shirt he may well have put on the England shirt by the time the latest Village News drops on your doormat.

Another young star in the making is Noah Fenton. He had never played rugby against adults when he played his first game for Taunton Titans. By the end of January this year he was the top try scorer in the league. It was always his intention to go travelling in February before going to university in the autumn this year so it looks like he may have played his last match for the club. He has already come to the attention of the Irish rugby set up and to Premiership side Exeter Chiefs. and played in a friendly match against Exeter University recently scoring a hat trick of tries. One win can lift them to 10th place, well clear of the relegation zone which was reduced to two clubs instead of three. One thing noticeable about Taunton's two wins at home this season against high flying attractive opponents Rosslyn Park and Plymouth Albion was that these fixtures attracted big crowds.
