


We are also continuing the fun in the evening by holding an Open Mic and Music event. There will be soft drinks to purchase from a vendor and a good time to be enjoyed by all.

#### **Taunton Rugby Club**

The approach of Easter at the time of writing means that for Taunton Rugby Club the end of the season is in sight and promotion and relegation issues are to the forefront of the club's thinking. For the very

young second team, Taunton Warriors, the battle is over as the League Championship was clinched in late March resulting in a fully deserved promotion. As for Taunton Titans relegation from the third level of English rugby is still a real threat.

The first team, Taunton Titans, sit bottom of the league and were playing at home to Darlington in the last match before Easter. Five minutes from the end of the match even the most fervent Taunton supporter had given up hope of avoiding the drop. Trailing 12-20 to Darlington Taunton were facing the prospect of almost certainly having to win their last three games

to stand any chance of avoiding relegation.

The team were playing into a strong wind but, driven on by the example set by their captain Ratu Vakalutukali, were still playing with belief and an intensity not seen very often this season and pounding away at the opposition try line. With just two minutes left Taunton scored a try to close the gap in the scores. Taunton grabbed the initiative straight from the restart and backed by a noisy enthusiastic crowd they hammered away at the Darlington try line deep into added time and scored a winning try much to the delight of

the home support. There are now three difficult matches left and although Taunton are still favourites for relegation the flame of hope still burns. If reading the Village News persuaded any of you to be part of that crowd, then thank you for your support. Today was a perfect example of how the team can be lifted by a big enthusiastic noisy crowd.

From a tale of a desperate battle to avoid relegation comes the story of unlimited success for the Taunton Warriors. They have finished champions in their league in just the second season since their formation. Coached and captained respectively by father and son John and Ollie Wrelton the team have won their league with two games still to play. John Wrelton is also the club chairman and has been ably assisted in the coaching duties by Brett Harvey who ended a distinguished playing career for Taunton Titans at the end of

> last season. The Warriors have dominated the league and at the time of writing they have won 19 out of 20 matches scoring over 1100 points so far. Team captain Ollie Wrelton has had an outstanding season for the club and, along with teammate Brodie Sheach, was recently selected to play for Somerset at Under 20 level. New challenges await the Warriors in their higher league next season with mouthwatering fixtures in the pipeline especially when they meet local rivals Bridgwater and Albion. When this edition of the Village News drops through your

letterbox it will be early May and there will be a short pause before preparations begin for next season. It will be more challenging for the Warriors next season, but they will relish the challenge. As for the Titans whether they win their fight to stay in National League 1 or

In the birdwatching year two months stand out, May and October. For rarity hunters October always delivers, as winter visitors arrive, some from as far away as Siberia. Among the regulars and generally common species, there are much rarer birds diverted off course by the changeable and often unfavourable autumn weather, and these are always exciting to see. When conditions are right, North American land birds, migrating down the eastern seaboard to the Caribbean and South America, are caught up in the remnants of autumn hurricanes. If they survive and are lucky, they make landfall on this side of the Atlantic, usually on offshore islands like the Isles of Scilly and the Outer Hebrides. Some, like the American waders, are strong flyers, capable of travelling vast distances. One, the Pectoral Sandpiper,

whose normal wintering grounds are in Argentina and Paraguay, is almost annual in Somerset. Exciting though October is May is my favourite month. Although spring

migration is

tailing off and many summer visitors are already breeding, late migrants like the Spotted Flycatcher

are still arriving. Though hard to find these days, there are usually one or two sightings in West Monkton. and with luck at

least a breeding pair. Above all, May is the best month for birdsong and affords an excellent opportunity to acquaint oneself with the common species at least.

Before technology eased matters the only sure way to pair a bird with its song and commit it to memory was to listen first and then sight the bird. Life is much easier now, and among a number of apps available for iOS and Android is Merlin, developed by Cornell University and free to download. All the observer has to do is run the app, record the bird, and Merlin does the rest, identifying the species there and then. A small degree of caution is needed with birds whose

alarm calls, rather than song, are similar but on the whole I've found it remarkably accurate.

It is, however, far more satisfying to learn birdsong by experience, and most of the common species are not difficult. Particularly among the thrushes, song is quite characteristic and easily memorised, and all are accomplished singers. Learning to separate Blackbird



and Song Thrush is a good start. Both are loud, and inclined to sing from high perches, but a giveaway is that the Song Thrush repeats each individual phrase up to four or five times. The Blackbird has a rich, tuneful song

but is rather let down by ending it with a few scratchy notes, again a giveaway.

There has always been much debate, often fuelled by newspaper features, about the finest songster. Blackbird and Song Thrush are certainly up there, as is the Robin, one of the few birds to sing throughout the year. The aptly named warblers are also in contention, and the Garden Warbler, rarely seen in gardens despite the name, and Blackcap are favourites for some. Both have similar rich, fluty songs and are difficult to separate even for the experienced. A friend once described the Garden Warbler song as 'like someone trying to run too fast' and rather unkindly, but accurately that of the Blackcap as 'like a madman trying to whistle'.

For me there is nothing quite like the song of the Nightingale, sadly now so rare here in Somerset. Once heard it is unmistakable, rich with loud crescendos and beautiful phrases. Like most birds which defend territory with song, the Nightingale is not much to look at, rather like a large robin without the red breast, but its song sets it apart. By the time you read this our local birds will have arrived at their regular haunts along the railway line between Creech and Durston. Although few in number they can be heard from the

canal towpath, east of the Engine House. They sing well at dawn, but a better experience is to listen to them on a calm warm May evening. Let us hope after a miserable winter and early spring we are granted some.

It's unusual for someone to tell me

they are an atheist. I don't mean just because I'm a vicar – people are usually very frank when it comes to challenging me about faith. And quite rightly so. There is a lot of nonsense spouted by church folk.

And nor do I think atheists are delusional. Atheism is a perfectly acceptable position to hold. It's just that in my experience, it is rarely a thing of certainty as it seemed to be on this occasion.

Most of us (myself included) are within the range of agnosticism – we don't know for sure – and we come down on one side of a line or another. Just. By the grace of ... something - or is that Something?

There is a type of scientific materialist who claims to need 'proof' of God - when they rarely demand the same proof for the existence of other un-demonstrables like love or courage or wonder – or a liking for beer. Some stuff isn't always the object of observable and measurable data.

One materialist once said to me it was only all ever about money. But when I suggested to him that the next time he was intimate with his wife he leaves her a tenner on the bedside table - or more if he thought that would improve things - he started to reconsider this. So, when this chap said he was an atheist, my initial thought was "What's your proof?" Sadly, we didn't have time for a proper conversation. And actually, I'm no philosopher. He'd have probably wiped the floor with

Why I'm 'religious' as opposed to not will, I know, have its roots in my upbringing and various insecurities and hopes. But one of the greatest insecurities we all share is the fear of being deceived: by a friend or partner; by a government or a church; or by finding out that in the End - there is no God.

So having a belief is, literally, a statement of faith - and of hope. And courage. Because I may be wrong. But for me, I think I live a better life and life has a deeper layer of meaning if I live 'as if' there is a God. And that is about all I can do.



WMPC works collaboratively with members of the community and partners to deliver our vision and objectives for the Parish, going over and above what is expected from a Parish Council.

Our vision is for WMPC and the local community to work together to protect and improve the social, recreational and environmental well-being of West Monkton and the lives of all who live, visit and work here.

#### **Our Priorities and Objectives**

#### What WMPC has achieved in 2023/24 Our Environment

- ·Enabled the planting of trees in the parish. Further trees have been planted in Maidenbrook Country Park (MCP) during 2023/24 and 200 whips have been obtained from the Woodland Trust to be planted on the Sports Pitch site adjacent to the Eastern Relief Road.
  - Continued to deliver a hi-vis initiative to encourage children to cycle and walk to school safely. More than 100 hi-vis jackets have been given to school children so far.
- Promoted public transport that is available in the parish.
- Delivered swap events for seeds and toys.
- Provided grant funding for individuals for Climate Change projects based in the parish.
- Promoted recycling and reusing through the continued delivery of the Community Fridge to reduce food waste and running monthly repair cafes.





- Delivered a Growing Competition.
- Delivered two Farm Walks.
- Secured more grant funding for the Community Garden enabling its expansion.
- Deployed the Speed Indicator Device at various locations across the Parish, the data collected is passed to the police to inform their parking enforcement schedule.
- Undertaken a review of the village signs and requested feedback from Somerset Council with a view to making identified improvements as soon as possible.
- Continuing to engage with Developers and Somerset Council Officers about the proposals for Monkton Heathfield Phase 2 Development, building a good relationship with Creech St Michael Parish Council and organising a public consultation event for members of our community to provide their feedback.
- Continuing to engage with Developers and Somerset Council Officers about the completion and handover of the Monkton Heathfield Phase 1 public open spaces.
- Reviewed the Phase 4 Hartnells Farm Development proposals and submitted comments to the Local Planning Authority.
- Commenced a project to develop a multi-agency approach to exploring natural flood management measures on streams and water courses in the parish to slow the flow of water and reduce the risk of flooding of residential properties in Bathpool and applied for grant
- Working with the Environment Agency to acquire land to enable a permanent flood relief pump to be installed in the Old River Tone at Bathpool.

#### **Our Community**


- Continued to deliver the Community Fridge, a great amount of food is being collected from shops and food waste is being reduced.
- Recruited in excess of 100 volunteers in the community to support community projects.
- Provided a weekly community café on Wednesdays from 2.30pm until 4pm at the BACH.
- Provided weekly Stay and Play Groups on Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning at the BACH.
- Carried out regular litter picks with volunteers in the community
- Delivered a successful community event to celebrate the King's Coronation.
- Delivered a Dog Show and Easter Egg Hunt at the Country Park.
- Taking the lead in organising a D-Day Event at the Country Park on 6th June 2024.
- Delivered a monthly community quiz at Tacchi Morris.

- · Delivered a festive volunteers evening at the BACH to thank all our volunteers for their support.
- Provide a monthly bereavement support group at the BACH.
- Continued to provide a Community Website www.monktonmatters.co.uk
- Improved existing footpaths through the installation of new gates and stiles on Public Rights of Way across the parish
- Provided grant funding to charitable, small and local groups to deliver goods or services for the benefit of members of the community in the parish.
- Completed the legal transfer of the sports pitch land adjacent to the ERR and installed a fenced dog walking area with accessible gates.
- Poppy of Honour Memorial has been designated to be permanently sited in the CP, planning permission has been obtained for a Pavilion for the Memorial and fundraising efforts have commenced.



#### Parish Councillor Reports:

Cllr Stuart Haskins - Chairman's Report

I hope this report finds you well and looking forward to a warm and dry summer. Let's face it, we have certainly had our share of wet weather this winter and I'm sure the keen gardeners out there will be desperate to make a start on their plots.

Your Parish Council has once again had a very busy year and I will try to bring you up to speed with all the Projects we have been working on without, I hope making my report too long. As you will see your Councillors have reported on issues, they cover at our meetings, however, I will be adding to those comments in my report. I am pleased to welcome Councillor Noel Munson to the PC team. He is a retired member of our Parish and in recent months been part of our repair team at the BACH.

The year started with the vesting of the new Somerset Council Unitary Authority on 1st April. This of course saw the demise of the 4 District Councils and Somerset County Council. Under the new set up Parishes have been grouped together into what are now called Local Community Networks (LCNs). Under this arrangement West Monkton PC sits in the Hestercombe LCN together with 7 other parishes these being Broomfield, Cheddon Fitzpaine, Creech St Micheal, Durston, Kingston St Mary, North Petherton and Thurloxton. I am currently the



Chairman of this LCN and I think it's fair to say that after a slow start we are now beginning to find our way and hopefully fill the gap left between Parish Councils and the new Somerset Council. April 1st also saw the "go live" of the new Taunton Town Council which, as some of you may know, took over control of a significant part of the Cheddon Fitzpaine PC area. I should point out that this has not significantly affected the way in which WMPC works with Cheddon Fitzpaine PC on matters such as our Neighbourhood Plan, the WW1 wood and Country Park.

As I am sure you are aware by now the Somerset Council is currently facing considerable financial challenges and major shortfalls in its budget both for this current year, 23/24, and going forward into 24/25 and beyond. As a result, and under the banner of "Devolution of Services" the Parish Councils have been asked if they are prepared to take on certain nonessential services in their community. WMPC has expressed an interest in taking on some of these duties but to date nothing has been agreed or committed to. However, we believe we can deliver some services more cost effectively and efficiently for our community possibly using our Parish Lengthsman and / or working with our LCN Partner Parishes.

Your Community Clerk, Kate Welsh, has been very busy this year and in addition to running the Stay and Play group, Community Café, the repair shop, Bereavement Group and much more she has been pivotal to the events taking place at the Country Park. These included the Easter Egg hunt, the Coronation Party, the Dog show, etc. Other events initiated by Kate have also been very successful in particular the monthly Community Quiz Nights which are run at the Tacchi Morris Arts Centre. Kate is of course the key link between the Parish Council and the Army of Community Volunteers, and it was enjoyable to meet and chat with some of "Kate's Army" at our volunteers' festive evening in December. Volunteering really does make a difference to your community, and it is only through this involvement support and commitment that we can continue to build our community and bring the old and new parts of the parish closer together. Our litter pickers, Community Fridge and Country Park teams to name just a few really have made a huge impact and really do make the difference in and around the parish. So, I would urge anyone who has time on their hands no matter how small it might be, please get in touch with Kate and join her

The World War One Wood and Country Park continue to develop and bring enjoyment to those who volunteer in it as well those who simply use it to exercise. Several events are now a fixture in the calendar as the location becomes well know across the County. Events like the Remembrance Day Service and Easter Egg hunt are now well attended,

and plans are developing well for the D Day 80 vear celebrations on June 6th this year. It was hoped that the amazing "Poppy of Honour" would be installed by June but that is now looking unlikely due to the complexity of the structure and its installation time required. It is hoped, however, that it will be in place by November this year ready for the Remembrance Day Service and its dedication.

Your Parish Council continues to meet twice each month except for August and December. In addition to the regular PC meetings, your Clerks and Councillors participate with numerous other groups and organisations such as the Garden Town Advisory Board, LCN, Multi-Agency Flood Group, A358 Road Improvements, SALC and many more. When added we attend in excess of 150 meetings each year in person and online. For the last two years the Parish Council has developed a Vision, Priorities and Objectives, for 2024 this has been expanded and a Strategic Plan for the Parish and Community has been developed. This sets out what the strategy is and objectives are for the coming year and how we will deliver our Vision for the Community. From this we hope that you will gain a better understanding of what we do and how the Precept is spent. It is unfortunate that we needed to increase the Precept again this year but as you will see it is considerably less than the average rise across the County or the figure residents of the new Taunton Council now find themselves having to pay. The PC Website (www.westmonktonparishcouncil.gov.uk) has been updated this year and is now easier to navigate, likewise Monkton Matters (www.monktonmatters.co.uk) is now the "go to" site for local information and updates on what's going on in and around the parish. MH2 the Garden Town development planning application or (Langaller Park as it will be known) was re-submitted by Persimmon / Redrow (The Developers) in early February of this year and as the development is in both West Monkton and Creech St Michael Parishes, we formed a joint Parish working group. Since the

original application was made some 2 years ago, we have held regular meetings with the CSM PC, the Developers, the County Planning Department and County Highways to raise our concerns, put forward alternative ideas and hopefully influenced all parties in making the correct decisions for our community. In some matters we have been successful in achieving change to the proposals but not so in others. Whilst approval of MH2 at some point is inevitable the experiences of WMPC with MH1 are still prominent in our minds and those experiences have been put to good use in our discussions. By the time you read this report the public consultation events at West Monkton





and Creech St Micheal will have taken place where I hope you have had a chance to make comment to the Parish Councillors be it for or against the development plans. Following these consultations your Parish Clerk and Councillors will draw all the feedback and comments together and submit it to the Planning Officer. That report will of course be available on the PC website.

MH1 continues to be a thorn in the side of your PC but at least we are now progressing on a number of fronts. Following snagging works by the Developers the adoption of estate roads and ERR by County Highways is progressing at last. In addition to this and following our public meetings in late in 2023 your Parish Council is now in the final stages of taking over the MH1 Public Open Spaces (POS). It was hoped that the acquisition of the land by your PC and the setting up of the new Management Company would be completed by the end of February, but it is now looking unlikely and that it will be mid to late April before legal acquisition is complete. That said, we are sure that the new arrangements will be a step change in the management of MH1 and with resident participation on the Board I am sure that the benefits will soon be evident to see.

Following an exceptionally wet winter flooding continues to be high on our list of issues with the area in around the Old River Tone in Bathpool being of particular concern. Your PC, working with the Environment Agency, is currently progressing the purchase of a parcel of land south of the Railway on Hyde Lane on which to install 2 permanent pumps. These works will be funded from the Hartnells Development S106 fund. Other areas of concern are the new attenuation ponds installed in recent developments. Wessex Water have investigated these to ensure they are installed correctly prior to adoption.

Cllr Alan Hall continues to lead a multi-agency working group to develop initiatives and projects that will "slow the flow" of water from the Quantocks into your parish. Also, in and around the parish we have numerous sections of blocked highway drainage. It is hoped that some of these sites will be repaired by SC Highways in the new financial year but given the ongoing financial position SC finds itself in, it is unlikely all of these repairs will be completed, and some sites may revert back the PC to resolve them. The Hartnells Phase 4 Planning Application was also submitted in late 2023. Your PC raised a number of concerns about the application involving drainage POS and the impact on Greenway.

Earlier this year your PC completed the legal acquisition of the land on the south side of the ERR which was designated for sports pitches under the MH1 development planning approval. In partnership and working with the Taunton Rugby Club and West Monkton Cricket Club, a committee has been formed to oversee the project. Plans have been prepared and a pre-planning advice application has been

submitted regarding the proposal to amend the original MH1 granted planning approval to reflect the new facilities on the site. A fenced off dog walking area is now in place and starting this spring work will commence to install pitch drainage and underground services after which the Rugby and Cricket pitches will be laid. Some funding for delivery has been received from MH1 developers, grant applications will be made to secure additional funding. Further development of the site is planned which will see the building of a skateboard facility and BMX pump track and changing rooms. At present the construction timings of these facilities aren't definite but hopefully will be in place within the next 2 years. Over 200 trees have also been secured from the Woodland Trust which will further enhance the site and local environment.

Thanks to the volunteers, the Community Shed/ Fridge continues to be a great success and the volume of food that now passes through it is increasing year on year with daily collections now reaching into more than 10 suppliers. The food, clothes, toys and the book swaps are also very popular so much so, that the initiative has now outgrown the shed. Your PC is therefore investigating how the facility can be expanded which may involve a second shed or a completely new building. Some grant funding has already been obtained so watch this space as they say. During the year Councillor Elliston retired from the PC due to relocating his home and a new job. Its pleasing to see he is still taking an active role in the running of the Community Garden which has really taken off this year and thanks to a recent Health and Wellbeing Grant from SALC, the Garden now has a Potting Shed, more tools and more growing beds. All being well and if the rain stops, this summer should see much more produce grown some of which will be placed in the Community Fridge/Shed.

So, in conclusion it's been a hectic year yet again for all the Councillors and Clerks I just want to say a final word that in addition to the numerous meeting I have mentioned the PC team have been out there running competitions, putting up gates and fences, cutting grass erecting sheds, setting up and running functions, raising sponsors and support.

On your behalf I would like to thank all the Councillors for their contribution to the community plus the Clerks, our Lengthsman and finally the volunteers; without their support many of our projects would not be possible or as successful and our Community would not be building and developing as it is.

#### Poppy of Honour National Memorial at Maidenbrook Country Park - Fundraising Underway

The Somerset Wood Joint Committee, made up of members of Cheddon Fitzpaine Parish Council and West Monkton Parish Council, are fundraising to install a pavilion to permanently house the Poppy of Honour National Memorial. The Poppy of Honour, created in 2018, is a National Memorial that honours British and Commonwealth Servicemen and Servicewomen listed as killed or missing in World War 1. It incorporates 1,117,635 individual remembrance handwritten poppies inside its encasement – one for each British and Commonwealth Servicemen and Servicewomen listed by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission as 'Killed in Action' or 'Missing in Action' together with those 'Shot at Dawn' then later pardoned and those who died from their wounds after the Armistice of the Great War.



Planning Permission has been obtained to install the Memorial at the Somerset Wood within Maidenbrook Country Park for the people to view free of charge but to be able to install it £100,000 is needed.



There's a bracing and chilly high-mindedness about Justine Triet's psychothriller, about a suspicious death whose only reliable witness happens to be blind. Sandra Hüller plays Sandra, a successful and fashionable author (that staple figure of French cinema), German by birth, but now living in a handsome chalet in the French Alps with her French husband Samuel, a former academic and would-be author himself, who has now hit a career slump and creative block and is currently hoping to salvage the family finances by fixing up the chalet as an Airbnb. It is while he is grumpily sawing and hammering upstairs, with the music on too loud, that Sandra attempts to give an interview, which simply has to be abandoned because of the noise. Sandra wearily attempts to take a nap, while their son Daniel takes

their dog Snoop for a walk. When he returns, his dad's corpse is lying on the snow outside the chalet with a brutal wound on his head. Did he fall from the top window? Did his head hit something on the way down? Or did someone hit him? Poor Daniel is an unreliable witness because he is blind. The film does not signpost the traditional twists and turns and dramatic reversals, but keeps a cool distance, letting us wonder if Sandra is guilty or not, and we are kept guessing until the end. It's a lowkey, almost downbeat



drama, but with something invigoratingly cerebral.







### Monkton Evening Women's Institute

#### Hi everyone

After such a wet winter, hopefully, we can now enjoy some spring sunshine and enjoy some warmer weather. In February we welcomed Beth Price who works for the Somerset Waste Partnership to answer the question ... why do we recycle?

More and more people recycle everyday, which is important to reduce the need for landfill and more costly forms of disposal. Recycling also reduces the need for extracting (mining, quarrying and logging), refining and processing raw materials all of which create substantial air and water pollution. 142.524 tonnes of recycling was collected and 96.6% of recycling was reprocessed in the UK, 54.4% of which stayed in the county. Only mixed paper and cardboard are exported outside the UK. Excellent kerbside sorting into boxes and bags helps them to get more recycling reprocessed closer to home and also reduces contamination by other materials which makes it easier to sell to UK based companies. Just to give you some idea:

- **Food Waste** is transformed into electricity and also used for compost to help grow more food.
- Paper/cardboard is sent to paper mills to be recycled;
- Glass is reprocessed to make other glass jars and bottles:
- Cans and foil are recycled to make other aluminium cans;
- Textiles are sent for reuse in UK and developing world or shredded into cotton felt/wadding/mops and other cloths;
- Shoes are sent to developing nations to be refurbished and used;
- Plastic bottles/pots/tubs/trays are sent to reprocessors in the UK to be recycled into plastic items as new plastic packaging, films, pipes, compost bins and fleece jackets;
- **Fridges/freezers** are broken down into separate components for reuse;
- Bric-a-brac sent to local outlets for recycling;

- Cooking Oil is turned into biofuel to generate electricity and heat;
- Paint is recycled for new paint products;
- **Plasterboard** is broken down and made into new plasterboard;
- Wood is made into a range of products including animal bedding and equestrian surfaces.

We can all play our part, so I think the motto is: 'KEEP RECYCLING AS MUCH AS YOU POSSIBLY CAN'.





I'm on track with my one million press up challenge, having completed over 700,000 up to the end of February.

As most of you are aware, I'm doing all this activity to fundraise for Viva!, an animal rights group that does amazing work on behalf of animals.
