
If you fancy joining our merry band of players, whether on stage or behind the scenes; then please do get

Taunton Rugby Football Club

In the last edition of the Village News I mentioned that Taunton Rugby Club had just managed to keep their hopes of avoiding relegation from the third tier of English rugby with two very late tries to clinch a win against Darlington with just three games of the season left. They won the next match, a tricky away fixture at Sale leaving them still at the foot of the league table with a home match against relegation threatened Cinderford and a trip to London to face mid table Blackheath. The club pulled out all the stops to ensure a there was a big crowd for the Cinderford game and if my pleas in the last edition for support bore fruit thanks. I have been watching Taunton for 14 years and in all that time I have never heard such a massive roar to greet the team at the start of the match from the almost 1400 crowd as there was that day. The crowd continued to roar their encouragement throughout the match and despite trailing early on Taunton gained another win to lift themselves off the bottom of the league. The players commented afterwards on the lift they received from the crowd so let's take this forward to next season. The team now needed to win at Blackheath and score at least 4 tries and hope that either Leicester Lions or Bishops Stortford lost difficult away fixtures.

Taunton played their part beating Blackheath 47-32 with 19-year-old Louie Sinclair kicking 5 conversions and 4 penalties, not missing any of his kicks at goal. A truly remarkable feat for such a



young man. With Bishops Stortford safe Taunton were relying on Leicester losing and with five minutes left they were 14-13 down. They then scored twice to secure their safety one point ahead of Taunton. So Taunton are relegated to National League 2 South West.

What was disappointing to me and quite frustrating was that the team won only 4 out of their first 22 matches and then won all the last 4 with try bonus points with basically the same players. Relegation will mean less travelling and hopefully Taunton will be amongst those teams striving to win promotion.

The news has not been all bad however. Taunton's under 15 boys team won the Somerset Cup for their age group with a thrilling 21-19 win against Winscombe. The captain of Taunton Warriors, Ollie Wrelton has been selected for the Southwest of England Under 20 team to play Lancashire. Despite being only formed since after COVID the Taunton ladies' team has progressed to such an extent that it provided no less than 6 players to the County team for the end of season inter counties matches. One of the ladies selected, Fiona Mossman played for the County on the same day that her son, Jarryd was selected along with five other Taunton teammates to represent the County in his age group. All in all this shows that Taunton is a club where although the first team had a difficult season there is a thriving succession club at all age levels which bodes well for the future.



Poppy of Honour National Memorial at Maidenbrook Country Park - Fundraising Underway



The Somerset Wood Joint Committee, made up of members of Cheddon Fitzpaine Parish Council and West Monkton Parish Council, are fundraising to install a pavilion to permanently house the Poppy of Honour National Memorial.

The Poppy of Honour, created in 2018, is a National Memorial that honours British and Commonwealth Servicemen and Servicewomen listed as killed or missing in World War 1. It incorporates 1,117,635 individual remembrance handwritten poppies inside its encasement – one for each British and

Commonwealth Servicemen and Servicewomen listed by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission as 'Killed in Action' or 'Missing in Action' together with those 'Shot at Dawn' then later pardoned and those who died from their wounds after the Armistice of the Great War.

Planning permission has been obtained to install the Memorial at the Somerset Wood within Maidenbrook Country Park for the people to view free of charge but to be able to install it £100,000 is needed.

It is a great honour and privilege that the Poppy of Honour will be located in





Community Fridge





Somerset Birds

The collective name for a flock of Goldfinches is a 'charm' and never has a title been more appropriate, for these are, indeed, charming little finches. This is one species that has greatly increased in number due in no small part to garden feeding stations. A favourite food is sunflower hearts. They will take the unshelled seeds too, but more reluctantly, and once a flock of Goldfinches has found a reliable set of feeders, you can be assured of a constant stream of visitors.



They are one of our smaller finches and are creamy buff in colour with black, white and red markings on the head. The gold stripe on the wings gives the bird its name, and this is visible on young birds too, although these lack the head markings until their first winter. The pale, sharply pointed beak acts as a specialist tool for extracting the seeds of thistles, their main natural food in late summer and autumn, but it can also deal effectively with sunflower hearts.

The song is a most pleasing jangle of high pitched notes, sounding to some ears like distant hand bells. This, and the bird's attractive appearance, made it very popular with bird trappers in Victorian times. Snared birds were sold at markets in tiny cages but even this cruel

stop Goldfinches singing,

hence they were very popular as avian pets. Thankfully various protection acts outlawed both the trapping and keeping of wild birds, and the population of Goldfinches, badly affected by these practices, quickly recovered.

Goldfinches can be seen all the year round. Some are resident but there are local movements, and some move south into France and Spain for the winter, although with bird feeders widespread there is probably less incentive now to do so. Usually seen singly or in pairs in spring and summer, quite large flocks, often with mainly juvenile birds, can be seen feeding on the clumps of thistles late in the year.

Goldfinches begin nesting in late May, and with two or, sometimes three broods, the season can last into early August. The nest is a neat, rather beautiful construction, usually on the outermost fork of a tree and

generally well hidden by the surrounding foliage. Built of moss and spider webs woven together, it is lined with down, wool or animal hair. In my experience nests are often in fruit trees and many householders will be unaware they have one in the garden. Four to five pale delicately spotted eggs are laid and these hatch within a fortnight. The chicks are fed by both adults on a regurgitated mixture of partly digested small seeds and insects. Like most members of the finch family there is no attempt at nest hygiene and, in the late stages, the rim of the nest is festooned with droppings. This matters little to the birds as a new nest is built for subsequent broods, and may even, it has been suggested, though with little evidence, act as a deterrent to predators. Goldfinches seem to have been little affected by the disease


trichomoniasis which has severely impacted the populations of Greenfinches and, to a lesser extent, Chaffinches. This distressing

ailment is spread by communal feeding at bird tables and regular cleaning of feeders is essential to reduce the risk of infection. In the case of Goldfinches at least, regular feeding has greatly increased survival in hard winters and is undoubtedly a benefit rather than a risk.

Goldfinches are certainly a common bird in and around West Monkton, and can even be found in the leafier parts of central Taunton where, sadly, the sound of their lovely song is often lost in the sound of traffic, Should you be in a quieter spot and hear their song, quite distinctive when recognised, do take a moment to stop and listen. **Brian Hill**

Cookies. Do you consent-o-matic? I do!

There is no doubting the usefulness the Internet - to look things up, order the shopping & sort out your bank account etc. But there are two very annoving bugbears that we all face these days in using it. Adverts and Cookie Consent boxes.

As soon as you dial up a website, the first thing you have to do is agree or disagree to cookies. Some years back now the EU agreed to the General Data Protection Regulations, which ostensibly are there to protect citizens' data rights.

After we left the EU we kept that law, so it still applies in the UK today. Part of those GDPR rules is the requirement for websites to request consent to storing cookies on your computer/iPad or phone. The only problem was, the law didn't dictate that websites must offer a straight Accept or Decline option. Instead it became 'the wild west' online: You can always 'accept' easily but - at least many sites -



front and centre, but it is certainly not common).

Cookies are not bad - insofar they are just tiny packets of inert data.




But it is how they can be used, mainly by advertisers, to track you and thus target you with adverts, and build up profiles on your online habits. The hassle to constantly decline every website you visit is utterly tedious. Enter Consent-o-matic.

Consent-o-matic is one of the most useful 'extensions' for Chrome, Edge, Firefox and Safari browsers. An extension is a tiny computer program that adds functions or abilities to other programs. You can install Consent-o-matic in your browser (Chrome/Edge etc) to add, what in my opinion, is the most useful new feature to your online experience. Every time you visit a website, it automatically fills in the 'Cookies: do you agree / disagree' boxes that come up. Genius! In particular, if you prefer to to disagree to cookies - the process that takes ages to manually do - it will very quickly do all the clicking for you. It even hides the consent box so you can get on and use the website. Its utterly brilliant. Now it doesn't work on every website but it does work on the vast majority, enough to make it well worth installing. For example, in Chrome on your laptop you click on the 3 make you go through multiple clicks vertical dots, then Extensions, then Visit Chrome Web Store. Type in order to 'decline'. (Some websites in Consent-o-matic and when it comes up, install it. And whilst you have started to give decline options are there, also install Adblock (white hand, red octagon logo). This extension, where it legitimately can, will block adverts from displaying all over your web page. Double genius!

So, next time you are asked for your consent, remember, you need to consent-o-matic it!













