



Somerset Birds

It is good news and bad news this autumn. Let's have the bad news first. After an accelerating decline in recent years, it looks as though the Spotted Flycatcher is heading for extinction in this area, and it is feared, right across swathes of southern England

where it was once a common summer visitor. This year I have been unable to find any at sites in West Monkton where they regularly bred. It is unobtrusive when nesting and it is possible, perhaps even likely, that the odd pair is present in private gardens,

where they generally go unnoticed, but the larger picture is grim. The same is true in nearby Creech St Michael where, at least, I've located two pairs. Sadly, only one of these bred successfully. The area around the church once hosted three or four pairs.

So familiar was this engaging bird in and around churchyards and rectory gardens it was once known colloquially as the 'churchyard bird'. Such habitats, managed without pesticides, provided a wealth of insects upon which this species entirely depends. Indeed, only ten years ago two pairs bred regularly in West Monkton churchyard, three in nearby Glebe Court and one in the adjacent rectory with other pairs scattered around the village.

Regular national surveys have shown an eighty percent population reduction since 1969 with a continuing decline. This year only one out of ten pairs returned to the usual sites, a disastrous slump. The reasons for this decline are poorly understood but one of them is clearly not lack of habitat, nearly all of which is unchanged. It is probable that a complex number of factors apply.

Crucially Spotted Flycatchers depend on large flying insects to raise their broods and even the casual observer has noticed a huge decline this year and, indeed, 2023. This means many nests fail and the population cannot be replenished. The reason for the lack of insects is itself not fully understood but strong indications exist. Spotted Flycatchers winter in part well south in Africa, some as far as Cape Province, and may now encounter as yet unknown problems during migration.

Other reasons are postulated, but whatever the cause, it is a great shame to lose this charming bird locally. The good news starts with the knowledge that Spotted Flycatchers are doing better further north, and in Scotland, where visitors cannot fail to note the abundance off summer insects. It is still common too in much of Europe, Scandinavia and Asia, where it has a wide distribution.

Much more encouraging is the news that our only two resident warblers, the Dartford and the Cetti's, are

both flourishing. These small birds are both skulking and usually hard to see but have quite different habitats. The Cetti's arrived in Britain in 1960, and has established itself in the wetlands Somerset has in abundance.

Locally they can be heard, if not seen, at several sites around Taunton, including the B & T Canal and Silk Mills Local Nature Reserve. The loud but brief burst of song from the males is distinctive and unmistakable. The Dartford Warbler, so named from its place of discovery, is a small but distinctive, heathland bird, slate grey above and deep wine-red below, with a long tail. The severe winter of 1962/3 reduced the British population to just ten pairs in the New Forest. Luckily this tiny bird has great powers of recovery and pairs can raise around 15 young in a season. Importantly they have proved capable of colonising new sites too, and reached Somerset, where they were previously unknown, late last century. Since then, despite the odd hiccup, numbers have increased steadily They depend entirely on a mix of low gorse and heather, and such habitat is reasonably safe from destruction in Somerset.

Apart from habitat destruction, the major threat to their survival is heavy snowfall which prevents them foraging for the small invertebrates hidden in the heather upon which they feed. Such events seem to be coming rarer, so the Dartford may continue to thrive.





This year there may be as many as 80 pairs on the Quantocks alone. Look for a tiny grey bird, around the size of (but definitely not the shape of) a Blue Tit skimming low over the heather, its tail trailing behind it. It will doubtless be a Dartford.



Taunton Rugby Football Club -Your Local Rugby Club

Since the last edition of the Village News the Taunton Rugby Club players got down to pre season training in readiness for the new season which began in early September. In the run up to the start of the season Taunton made a big positive move to show they mean business this season by signing Ollie Devoto from Premiership side Exeter Chiefs. Devoto played over 200 games in the rugby Premiership for Bath and Exeter and made 2 appearances for England. He



is only just 31 years old and has many years of rugby left in him, hopefully. He will also be taking on a coaching and an ambassadorial role and will assist the club's Commercial Coordinator in trying to drum up sponsorship.

The club also welcomed back into the squad Nick Mason, a fine player with over 180 appearances for the club who had missed all of the previous season. With the Devoto signing and Mason's return expectations at the club were high and many people I spoke to expected Taunton to win the league and gain promotion with ease. The fact that Taunton had won their last 4 matches in their relegation battle last season only added to the optimism. To me this seemed disrespectful to the other teams in the league and there was much disappointment with the opening day defeat away to Loughborough Students followed 2 weeks later by a heavy defeat at Camborne who have received heavy financial backing to enable them to assemble a powerful team. Taunton have however had two exciting league wins at home and if they can maintain their home form and start picking up wins away from home they can mount a promotion challenge.

The standard of rugby played by both Taunton and their opponents is very high, the matches are exciting

and I would urge anybody thinking about maybe coming to watch to give it a try. There is a great enthusiastic and friendly atmosphere at matches. There are home matches on November 16 and December 7. Pre match lunches can be booked by contacting the club and they are ideal for local businesses for entertaining clients, networking or simply rewarding staff. The lunches are top class and everyone seems to enjoy the atmosphere there. Last season the second XV, Taunton Warriors secured promotion by romping away with their league, winning 17 matches and losing only 1. They are now facing tougher opponents this season but have made a strong start winning two of the three opening matches and only narrowly losing the third. They are also well worth watching and will have home fixtures on 14th and 21st December.

Charlie suffered a severe ankle injury at a time when, according to the head coach, he was always the first name on the team sheet. Charlie, standing at over 6 feet tall was a tremendous asset to the club generally but especially as a line out jumper.

Charlie had such a long wait for surgery on the ankle and it was over 2 years before he was able to

resume training. He returned to playing at the start of the current season and in his first game back he fell awkwardly and broke his left leg requiring another operation and




a 6 day stay in hospital. Despite this he managed to attend the latest home match on crutches to add his support for the team on the field. Everyone at the club wishes him an early recovery.

Letter from Rev Jim

A few weeks ago, I was on a train coming back from a visit to my daughter in Manchester enjoying the space of 4 empty seats, when 3 women came and joined me. They'd been on a hen-do somewhere and had clearly over-indulged and under-dressed – and, in my old-fashioned opinion, were probably old enough to have known better.

I was not in uniform and, wanting to avoid involvement, did the only thing possible under the circumstances and stuck my nose into my book with a 'Do not disturb' scowl across my face. These actions proved inadequate for my new rowdy coach-companions and I was soon to be included in their bawdy repartee. Knowing what was coming I was frantically trying to divert the question "So, what do you do?" when one of them said, "So, what do you do?"

I usually try to avoid telling people I'm a vicar so I delayed the response by asking what they thought I did. Their wide-ranging suggestions gave me some ideas for a second career, but when I finally relented and revealed my 'higher calling' the tipsy response was a colourful version of "No way!"

Luckily, I had recently acquired a new phone which had internet access (who knew!) and was able to show them my picture on the benefice website eliciting giggled apologies and offers to deliver themselves of a lengthy and detailed Confession.

I declined.

But it struck me how we often treat people according to what their job is. I went from being a passenger to a priest and that changed everything. Which is a shame. Someone once said "We are human beings, not human doings". Our value is not in our achievements but in who we are. 

Somerset Arts Weeks

Inspired by the wonderful and joyful atmosphere in the church during the Wedding Dress Exhibition earlier this year, a decision was taken to offer St Augustine's at West Monkton as a venue for Somerset Arts Weeks. SAW has been running for about 30 years and every alternate year various venues all over Somerset showcase the work of Somerset Artists. The theme for this year's exhibition was 'Landscape - Flux and Flow' offering artists the chance to reflect on climate change and its effects on the land, sea, environment and landscape.

Following some extensive preparation, our exhibition was professionally curated and showcased 123 paintings in a variety of media, and some pottery, reflecting the SAW theme for this year. We opened the doors to our free exhibition not knowing quite what to expect but happily our first weekend was very busy with over 100 visitors across the two days, and this continued across the fortnight of SAW.

Most of the paintings were for sale, and we were delighted when the 'red dots' (marking a piece that had sold) started to appear. There was art for all at all prices – as well as the exhibited works being for sale, artists provided merchandise for sale in the form of cards, books, unframed works including prints; the merchandise was very popular. We also offered visitors a chance to vote for the 'Best in Show' competition: a very hard task in view of the wide variety of subjects and styles. A small book prize was awarded to the winning artist.

Thanks are due to the army of volunteers who helped to make the event come together as successfully as it did. It would be invidious to name names – but you know who you are! Big shout outs to those establishments who lent us display boards and other essentials: Tacchi-Morris, West Monkton Parish Council, Hestercombe, Brewhouse, St James's Church, Taunton.

And of course, thanks to our excellent team of bakers who supplied visitors with coffee, tea and cakes throughout. I don't think I'll ever say 'take a pew' again without thinking of people just relaxing with refreshments, absorbing the beauty and challenge of the art around them, and the peaceful ambience in the church.

All refreshments proceeds and donations, plus 20% on all sales were added to the 'Regeneration Fund': our project to replace the current heating system and create a fully accessible community hub with kitchen.

Those impacted are encouraged to apply for Pension Credit.



Number 12 bus – revised timetable from 1st November

As many residents will know, the number 12 bus which serves our Parish has been funded by original monies from the Monkton Heathfield 1 developers, with the service being operated by Somerset Council. With funds reducing over the delivery of the service, Somerset Council has looked to prolong the continuation of the route by making reductions to the operating timetable.

At recent Parish Council meetings we have heard from several residents who are frequent users of the service, which currently operates at times and on a route not entirely covered by Buses of Somerset 21/21A, and we have been liaising with Somerset Council in order to protect some of the proposed reductions, whilst also being mindful of the reducing money from which this service is funded.

Overgrown Boundary Hedges

From time to time the Parish Council is approached by residents with concerns about hedges which have grown over public pathways and into roadways. Pathways must be kept clear to their full designed width for the benefit of all users. Hedges growing over footpaths and cycle paths can make it difficult to pass by, particularly for disability scooters and those with pushchairs and children, those who are partially sighted or visually impaired and can be a hazard to pedestrians and cyclists by causing injuries to flesh or eyes, especially from fast growing brambles. People may also be forced to step into the road to get by with the risk of being hit by traffic.

Hedges overgrowing alongside roadways can be a hazard by blocking site lines for motorists and pedestrians and can also present problems to cyclists forcing them away from the kerb and further into the road.

Occupiers of properties with hedges bordering public footpaths, cycle paths and roads are reminded that they are, generally, responsible for cutting their hedges to ensure they don't inconvenience or endanger passersby. There are many examples around the Parish where hedges are clear of the pathway at ground level but have grown upwards and outward so that at head height the effective width is considerably reduced. Hedges should be kept clear of any path vertically from the inner edge to a height of at least 2.3 metres. The same applies to trees, shrubs etc which may grow over paths and also growth from behind fences that spill over the top. Examples of this include brambles and other thorny growth which could catch a passer-by in the face or elsewhere.

It is appreciated that some people are unable to look after their hedges themselves. If a resident is struggling to keep up, for example due to age or disability, then the Parish Council has a close relationship with the local Village Agents team where we can signal for support if the resident gets in touch with us (see contact information below). Alternatively, if you have a neighbour in this situation and you are able to volunteer your help that would be a caring and lovely thing to do.

If your home has a boundary alongside a public pathway or roadway may we please ask that you check to be sure nothing on your property has overgrown as described above. If anything is overgrown it will be greatly appreciated if you will arrange for the offending growth to be cut back with the recommended minimum 2.3 metre vertical clearance in mind. Thank you.

Where an overgrown and obstructive boundary hedge is not believed to be the responsibility of an individual household, the Parish Council will seek to arrange for Somerset Council, the Highways Department or landowner, as appropriate, to deal with the matter as quickly as possible. If you see overgrown and obstructive hedges around the parish, that you believe are not the responsibility of individual households, please do report these by email to -

Poppy of Honour National Memorial at Maidenbrook Country Park - Fundraising Continues

The Somerset Wood Joint Committee, made up of members of Cheddon Fitzpaine Parish Council and West Monkton Parish Council, are fundraising to install a pavilion to permanently house the Poppy of Honour National Memorial.

The Poppy of Honour, created in 2018, is a National Memorial that honours British and Commonwealth Servicemen and Servicewomen listed as killed or missing in World War 1. It incorporates 1,117,635 individual remembrance handwritten poppies inside its encasement – one for each British and

Commonwealth Servicemen and Servicewomen listed by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission as 'Killed in Action' or 'Missing in Action' together with those 'Shot at Dawn' then later pardoned and those who died from their wounds after the Armistice of the Great War.

Planning Permission has been obtained to install the


Memorial at the Somerset Wood within Maidenbrook Country Park for the people to view free of charge but to be able to install it $\pounds140,000$ is needed.


It is a great honour and privilege that the Poppy of Honour will be located in Maidenbrook Country



Friday 20th December 2024: Swede Caroline (2024) 15 (Mockumentary / Comedy)



22/11/24 Anselm German Docu/Drama Cert: PG 1hr 35minutes Wim Wenders' portrait of artist Anselm Kiefer. The director's serious examination of the German artist's life and work has an

artist's life and work has an architectural quality as it moves around some monumental art – and studios.

The director brings a certain awe, or even shock, or even a kind of reverently docu-dramatised

PTSD to his film about the German artist <u>Anselm Kiefer</u>. The creator of paintings, photographs, colossal installations and illustrated book artefacts is celebrated but in some quarters criticised for his engagement with German fascism and the Holocaust.

There is fascination – and trepidation – in watching the master at work, strolling or cycling around his vast warehouse, with creations piled or stacked in every corner. Kiefer's angry, passionate, haunted images are driven, of course, by Germany's dark past, and

Wenders's film persuasively suggests that it is in the ruins of 1945, the year of the artist's birth, that the seed of inspiration is to be found.

Eka Chavleishvili is superb as an unmarried fortysomething woman whose life is turned upside-down by romance in Elene Naveriani's handsome drama. Finally free from the overbearing chauvinism of her father and brother, she dedicates herself to the running of her austere little

shop in a Georgian mountain village (she stocks a sparse selection of toiletries, cleaning products and sundry disappointments) and to her hobbies – picking blackberries near the river gorge and demolishing enormous, slab-like portions of cake. But then, suddenly and unexpectedly, love finds Etero. A passionate encounter with delivery man Murman (Temiko Chichinadze) next to the



detergent boxes in her storeroom divests her of her virginity. Now she must balance her newfound yearning for emotional contact against her hard-won freedom.







eRIB is Home

After 31 days, 20 hours and 46 minutes, Harry Besley arrived safely back in Lyme Regis on his electric RIB 'Electra', becoming the youngest powerboat Skipper to circumnavigate Great Britain and the first and fastest ever to do so in an electric boat. Presented with a glass trophy to commemorate the occasion, Harry and Mum Jagui were welcomed home on Wednesday 14th August 2024 by friends, family and sponsors. Having set off from Lyme Regis on 13th July, Harry and Electra stopped at 48 locations to charge. With only 8 nights in a proper bed, much of the rest

two ground support vehicles (including the UKs first 100% electric pick up truck, a Maxus T90EV) loaded with charging accessories and camping equipment were critical to the success of the Challenge, ensuring the boat could charge, and the team could eat and sleep at all the stop locations. Using a combination of three phase shore side AC sockets, and a few DC

fast chargers now installed along the south coast (Plymouth, Cowes and Poole Harbour) the 126kWh battery took between 2 and 20 hours to charge, depending on the supply. Help was on hand at all the stops, with some harbour staff going above and beyond their duty to get the team on their way. At Padstow, the harbour staff used their manitou to lift the AC-DC transformer onto the pontoon; at Bridlington, after a dry charge on the dock, the staff there lowered the boat by crane to enable the team an extra hour after the tide went out; and at Hartlepool a member of the Marina team went on a 2 hour round trip to collect a charging cable left on the dockside at the last stop. Sailing Clubs opened their doors and allowed use of their facilities, and the Sea Cadets in Inverness provided a bunk house, and their chef cooked up dinner! Friends welcomed the team at all times of the day and night and volunteers from the Maritime Volunteer Service arrived at dockside at 6 or 7 of the stops to provide encouragement, moral support and in one case, dinner!
