

Letter from Rev. Jim

In my life, New Year's Resolutions tend to suffer the same abrasive contact with reality as Lenten Fasts. As anyone who has seen me in person will testify, I am not big – if you see what I mean – on diets. I do understand the health benefits of carrying less weight and I do also understand the problem we have in the West of over-consumption. But a health fad can often disguise corporal vanity or, worse, a self-righteous control over our bodies.

I am a bit wary of the concept of control. It often comes in tandem with individual freedom and a right to choose. Sounds fine if you have the money and power and self-discipline to attain such things. But many of us are 'done to' and have a very limited range of actual choices. And we also have to cope, to live and to flourish.

It is said – I have not actually checked – that in Mark's Gospel, once Jesus is arrested in the Garden of Gethsemane all the verbs with Jesus as the subject are passive not active – he was arrested, he was led, he was taken. His primary act of salvation is in having no choice, no power and in doing nothing. Books have been written on the subject.

The faith of the church has a lot to say to and for people with no agency of their own. It is not a case of laziness or apathy, it is a case of seeing the truth about the way the world is and yet finding room for celebration and joy.

I often say of myself, "Why have a six-pack when you can have the whole barrel?"

Self-deprecating, I know. But there is a freedom in naming reality for what it is and living with the truth of that.



Following the parish council being awarded almost £190K in National Lottery funding to support its work at Maidenbrook Country Park, a Volunteer

The draft budget for the parish council for the year 2025/2026 has been developed and discussed by the Parish Council. Its final approval will take place in January. As more services are falling to the parish council to deliver going forward there is likely to be an increase in the Parish Council's 2025/26 budget and precept demand but it is hoped that the increase will be less than in previous years.



THE GIFT THAT KEEPS ON GIVING THINKING OF A UNIQUE GIFT FOR YOURSELF OR A LOVED ONE!

We are seeking donations in order that a Pavilion can be erected to house the POPPY OF HONOUR at Somerset Wood in the Maidenbrook Country Park in Taunton. When built it will become an official Commonwealth War Memorial. Visitors will be able to view Free of Charge.

The POPPY holds 1,117,635 individual remembrance poppies inside its encasement, representing the number of British and Commonwealth servicemen and servicewomen listed by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission as 'Kiled In Action' or 'Missing In Action' together with those 'Shot at Dawn' then later pardoned and those who died from their wounds after the Armistice in WW1. You will have the unique opportunity to have yours or a loved one's name on a plaque. Businesses can also contribute. These will be placed near to the pavilion for all to view for perpetuity.

Minimum donations are £25 for a small plaque, £50 for a medium and £75 for a large plaque. This operation will continue until funding is complete. For information is available via this link or by scanning the QR code.



'Keep our Parish Tidy' Volunteers







Taunton Rugby Football Club your local rugby club

It will be 2025 when the Village News containing this article drops through your letterbox. So, from all at Taunton Rugby Club, a Happy New Year to

those of you who read this.

Win, lose or draw 2025 will be a year of celebration as it marks 150 years since the club was formed and the club are intent on proudly marking this anniversary in style. There is every reason to be proud. The club has a proud history from those founding members who formed the club in 1875 to those who work hard to ensure that the club continues to carry on bringing high class rugby to the local population and developing young players from the age of 5 to take their place in Taunton senior teams of the future. Running a sports club like Taunton Rugby is no easy task and credit must go to the club's elected officials and permanent staff who work so hard to ensure that the club is on a sound financial footing, successful on the pitch and is a great sociable venue.

There has already been a dinner last year to launch the club's 150th anniversary celebrations which will culminate in a gala dinner in the summer. It would be an even greater occasion if some of the local population joined in the celebrations and anyone wanting details of the events scheduled needs simply to contact the club for information.

On the pitch things are going well. Pride of place goes to the Colts team. These 16 and 17 year olds have won all their matches this season scoring over 50 points in most games. They are superbly coached and play well as a team. At that age the youngsters usually want to try to score on their own but I have seen them play and

there is plenty of passing to better placed teammates rather than going alone. These lads are showing maturity at a young age which will serve them well as they are already showing the skills and maturity which will be needed if they are to challenge for places in the senior teams in the future.

The first XV, Taunton Titans lost 2 of their first 3 games since when they have won 6 out of 7 and now sit fourth in the league with a game in hand on the two teams just above them. To gain promotion they must win the league but this looks a difficult task as they sit 10 points behind the powerful Camborne team of expensive star players. The size of this task has not discouraged Taunton and they have played some superb entertaining rugby, especially at home, where they have a 100% winning record in some high scoring entertaining matches led by their inspirational captain and last season's player of the year, Ratu Vakalutukali. The next home fixtures are on 11 January (big match against Camborne),

a Friday night match on 24 January and on 15 February. Taunton's second team, the Warriors, having gained promotion last season have quickly found their feet in the higher Division and sit comfortably in the top half of the league. They feel that they are in with a chance of a further promotion if they can push on in the second half of the season and win the



home fixtures against the few teams they lost to on their travels. The next home fixtures are all in February on 1st, 8th and on Friday 21st of that month. I watched the Taunton Ladies team recently. They are extremely keen with some really talented players but would welcome more numbers. They train on Monday and Wednesday evenings. Anybody wondering about whether the contact element in the sport would be off putting need not worry. On training nights there is just running and handling the rugby ball for those worried about contact. There is a really friendly supportive atmosphere amongst the group and a warm welcome awaits any ladies or girls wanting to try it out. There is a good social side too.

Hoping to see plenty of the readership at Taunton Rugby Club's splendidly appointed ground and clubhouse in 2025. All matches except the first XV are free admission so why not pay a visit on a match day.

St Augustine's West Monkton Stories from behind the scenes.

The biggest story starts when the regeneration plan for the rear of the church was still in its formative stages, and we noted that the boiler was thirty years old and would need replacing before too long. Our plan for regeneration is ambitious and we know lots of

funding is needed, grants and serious donations as well as our regular fundraising events. Fast forward to the end

of the SAW art show at St Augustine's. The backstage crew had worked their socks off and created a first-rate exhibition which was successful for the artists as well as raising



£1600.00 for our regeneration work. It was the beginning of October, and the weather was becoming autumnal when we found the boiler didn't want to fire up - or if it did, it wouldn't stay on for long enough to heat the church. How would we heat the church for future services and events?

Most West End productions have significant financial backing by serious funders called 'Angels'.

To have a building as big as St Augustine's without heating of any kind is serious – the cold sets into the fabric and the church rapidly ceases to be warm and welcoming.

We had a competitive quote for a new commercial boiler: £18000.00, to be installed by a local company. Our fundraising, although successful, had not raised that sort of money yet. And so, we approached a number of people who became St Augustine's Angels by donating serious funds towards the boiler. West Monkton Parish Council also made a generous grant, and happily the boiler has been ordered, with a view to installation before Christmas. The show will go on! So, a really big thank you to all St Augustine's Angels. *If you would like to become one of St Augustine's angels there are a few options:*

Somerset Birds

Winter thrushes, those which do not breed in Britain, were late arriving this year, almost certainly because of mild weather in Europe and Scandinavia. The earliest birds are generally with us in early to mid-October, but, apart from the odd individual, Redwings and Fieldfares, the most common winter thrushes, did not reach West Monkton and the surrounding area until mid-November. This autumn there was a good supply of berries, particularly on the yew trees around the village, and plenty of windfall apples too, a favourite food for Fieldfares. Resident Song Thrushes, Mistle Thrushes and Blackbirds also enjoyed this bonanza, and the yews in particular were soon stripped.

Windfall apples remain a lot longer, but usually by January even this resource has ended. At this time, the birds can be seen more readily in open areas, fields, pasture and large gardens, foraging for worms and other small invertebrates. Both Fieldfares and Redwings are wary, but as cold spells make feeding more difficult, they become more approachable, and will then visit smaller gardens and feeding stations. In prolonged freezing weather some perish, but others move farther south into France and northern Iberia. The Fieldfare is the larger of the two, about the size of a Mistle Thrush with a subtle range of colours, slate grey and dark brown above, with a small black throat patch and dark chevrons below. Like Redwings, with which they usually associate, they are sociable birds, forming large flocks, which call noisily in flight. They are resident over much of eastern Europe, and summer visitors further north into Scandinavia and Russia. The occasional pair has bred in Scotland and northern England, but this is exceptional, In Poland, they are easily seen in urban parks, in Warsaw and Krakow, but woodlands are their main habitat. The Redwing is much more like our familiar Song Thrush, and can be confused with it. Like the Song

Thrush it is dark brown above, lacking the warm tones usually seen in the Song Thrush. It is streaked, rather than spotted

below, and has very noticeable stripes above and below the eye. The most obvious feature, which gives the bird its name, is rust-red markings along



the flank and the under wing.

Almost all our Somerset Redwings come from northeast Europe and Russia. Interestingly, the bird breeds in Iceland, and is a different sub-species, with much more streaking on the belly. These birds winter mainly in Ireland,

and are rare in Somerset, but are possibly overlooked. Redwings are common breeding birds in the northern forests. Although Fieldfares



and Redwings are common winter visitors, keen birders pay them close attention, because carried along with the immigrant flocks is the occasional very rare thrush. An example of this was a Black-throated Thrush found in a ground-feeding Redwing flock on

Curry Moor a few years ago. This bird breeds no nearer than the Urals and usually winters from northern Iran to Afghanistan. I have found while walking West Monkton, examining Redwings perched high in trees fruitful. In November, I found a Hawfinch among them. Even locally, where I am sure there are a few, this is a difficult bird to see. By the beginning of March, the winter thrushes are on the move again, and the size of flocks rapidly diminishes. All but a few stragglers are gone by the end of the month, but by then our Swallows are steadily moving northwards. Something surely to look forward to. Brian Hill

course', but not all children have this. In Somerset there are now around 600 children and young people in care. Some of these will have had experienced things in their short lives that we cannot imagine. Route1 Advocacy and Independent Visitors service supports children and young people who are in care or

have a social worker. They do this by matching volunteers with young people as either short term Advocates, or longer term Independent Visitors. The service recently had an independent internal

review and was graded as Outstanding; and was shortlisted to the final 3 in the Frontline National Award 2024 'Team of the Year' **Independent Visitors** These volunteers make a

long term commitment to one child in care. They visit the child once or twice each

month to build a trusting, supportive relationship and friendship that can sometimes last many years. This can bring life-changing experiences and opportunities to a the child or young person - and their Independent Visitor!

Advocates

Volunteers work alongside individual children to ensure their voices are heard, and their wishes and feelings are taken into account when decisions are being made which affect them. Each child's support is usually short term and there is no expectation of a long term commitment to any particular child.

A recent trainee volunteer said "I started out thinking 'what on earth can require 5 days of training?' I now know why and think you have it just right."

La Chimera 3 January Italy Adventure/Comedy Cert: 15 2 Alice Rohrwacher's new film is a beguiling fantasy-comedy of lost love: garrulous, uproarious and celebratory in her absolutely distinctive style. It's a movie bustling and teeming with life, with characters fighting, singing, thieving and breaking the fourth wall to address us directly.

The setting is Riparbella in Tuscany in the 1980s, and Josh O'Connor is

tremendous as Arthur, a dishevelled Englishman in a grubby white suit sporting six-day stubble and a perennial cigarette. He is a former archeological scholar who has assumed the morose, slouching gait and coiled style of a gangster. When we first see him, he has just been released from an Italian prison. In the course of what were once his entirely respectable studies in this region, he befriended Flora, a local, ageing aristocrat in her vast, crumbling house (a lovely performance from Isabella Rossellini) and fell in love with her daughter Beniamina.

La Chimera is a captivating film of a sad, lovelorn adventure that utterly occupies its own fictional space; it expresses its eccentric romance in its own fluent movie dialect.

How to actually pick a 'Password'

We have all faced the pressure of making up a

password. Multiple Times. We might reuse a password 'because no one wants access to my groceries shopping list', or just use a simple one

because 'we can't remember anything complex'. All completely understandable reactions that many of us have. There is a very helpful graphic that is worth looking up on the Internet about password strength. Its too big to include in this article, but go to Google and type in 'famous password table' and select the (most likely) top entry from Reddit. The table shows you how long it takes a computer to crack your password, based on its length and what types of characters are in it. Its an eye opening table!

An organisation in the USA called NIST have published up to date guidance on how to pick a password and it has some interesting guidelines. Its a bit of a long read but a couple of intriguing ones are (1) Don't keep changing your password except when there is a suspected breach - because the chance is the replacement passwords will be weaker and (2) No need to make *complex* passwords, simply make them *long*. (i.e. you can use words!)

How long? Well, some websites do, oddly, restrict the length of passwords but, assuming there is no restriction, in 2024 passwords should be an absolute minimum of 14 characters, so long as they have upper & lower case letters in, but preferably *somewhat longer*.

NIST recommend we actually come up with PassPhrases instead of PassWords.

So, here is a helpful technique, if you are looking to improve your passwords!

I recommend people start with (at least) 3 random words. BatteryHorseStaple, for example. You can use colours, places you like, food you love. PurpleMunichPancakes - the more humorous the better. ElevateElectricSandwiches. You get the idea. Those last two passwords come in at 20 and 25 characters respectively!

Then for sites that still insist on numbers and symbols - even though modern guidelines no longer insist on complex passwords (you know like F%5h,@*PK kind of thing - which is far too short but way too complex to remember), simply tack on one digit and one symbol: 5* or 7! kind of thing, so that the website

doesn't complain. According to the 'famous password table' graphic, a (humorous, memorable)

PassPhrase, with digit and symbol on the end, of only 18 characters in length (the above examples were 20 and 25 and that was without number and symbol) will take a whopping 26 trillion years for a computer to crack. So long as you don't give the password away, that is!
