

In late February Carole Britton, a resident of Monkton Heathfield, noticed a strange bird among her feeders popular with the wintering Common Starlings. Fortunately for the many birders who subsequently saw the bird she was sufficiently intrigued to make on-line enquiries and the stranger was quickly identified as a first-summer Rose-coloured Starling. Although the bird was mobile in the green spaces and gardens around Bawler Road and Knight Close, with patience, most visitors (some from as far away as Devon and Cornwall) had, at least, satisfactory views and many obtained good photographs. Rose-coloured
Starling is an interesting bird with behaviour and feeding habits similar to the familiar
Common variety. It is a scarce but regular visitor to the U.K.

mostly in autumn. The majority are juveniles, unspectacular in appearance, being mostly grey brown but showing enough variation from the Common Starling to make identification possible given good views.

It is almost annual in Somerset, and doubtless some are missed among the thousands of visiting Starlings from eastern Europe and Scandinavia. A first winter bird like this one with a patchwork of

faded pink and grey black in the plumage is more unusual. At the time of writing, it may well have moved on, in the company of the rapidly diminishing flocks of

Common Starlings to the summer breeding sites. It will soon moult into adult plumage, this an unsullied piebald mix of rich pink and black. Then it really will be a 'Rose-coloured Starling.'

Although it has much in common with the regular Starling recent research has shown it to be not as closely related as once thought. For this reason, it has been placed in a scientific genus of its own *Pastor* with the Latin name *Pastor roseus*, reflecting its alternative, but now little used name, 'Rosy Pastor.'

This rare visitor has travelled far to reach Monkton Heathfield. Rose-coloured Starling breeds colonially from the Crimea and eastern Turkey through Kazakhstan and into Asia. Isolated colonies occur in Bulgaria and Asia Minor. They breed, often in large numbers in holes, sometimes like Common Starlings under roof tiles and cavities in walls, but also in the company of other hole nesting species like Beeeaters and Sand Martins. I once had the pleasure of seeing just such a colony in a sand quarry in eastern Bulgaria, quite a display of brilliance from the Starlings and the colourful Bee-eaters.

Rose-coloured Starling is an eruptive species. In summer it is very dependent on the myriads of Grasshoppers found in open grassland. Should this Grasshopper harvest fail, as it occasionally does, the birds are forced to move westwards, away from their home range, in search of food. This is when it is most likely that adult birds reach Europe and our shores. 2020 was just such a year, and one adult made it to Somerset, spending some days near Curry Rivel, typically in the company of local Common Starlings. Almost all Rose-coloured Starlings winter in northern India, but for poorly understood reasons some, a very few, head in the opposite direction. These tend to be inexperienced juveniles. The Monkton Heathfield bird may have been one of these and could have been around for some time, certainly enough time to moult into its first summer plumage. But for the curiosity and interest shown by Carole it may well have gone unnoticed, and unrecorded.

Closing with another interesting bird, May is the best time to see the secretive and elusive Bittern. This rare member of the heron family spends much of its time hidden in the reeds, although its booming call is heard during spring. Male Bitterns have a number of partners but take no part in rearing offspring. Females do all the hard work and, as they return to the nests with food, sightings are almost guaranteed. Ham Wall RSPB is the place to go.

It is very difficult to imagine what it was like to be living in 1875 as it is such a long time ago. But that was the year in which Taunton Rugby Club

was formed when an enterprising gentleman named Jimmy Loveday hired Fullands rugby pitch and put together a Taunton RFC team to beat Weston-super-Mare. Since then as a result of hard work, enthusiasm and lots more hard work the club has gone from strength to strength and now sits proudly as one of the top 50 clubs in the country.

Most of the on field progress has taken place in this century and it may not be a coincidence that this success occurred after the club moved from Priory Park in 2001 to its superb purpose built home ground in Hyde Lane, Bathpool. In 2010 Taunton reached their then highest playing level by gaining promotion to National League 2, the fourth tier of English rugby. National League rugby was a big step up and Taunton struggled for a couple of seasons before putting in strong promotion challenges. Every season when they looked like gaining promotion there were always one or two teams that got the better of Taunton denying them promotion.

Then in 2019 it seemed that Taunton at last had a team to gain promotion. However just as Taunton looked like they were going to win the league, Covid arrived and the league season was halted. After a few months of uncertainty Taunton were declared champions and promoted to National League 1,

their history. Rugby resumed in the autumn of 2021 and Taunton spent three years battling it out against some of the giants of English rugby with the standard of play reaching new heights. The third season was one season too far and the club were

their highest level in

narrowly relegated despite winning their last four games. The club's target this season was win the league and get back to National League 1. The club have performed well this

season and with

three matches left to play at the time of writing sit in third place in the league but the top two teams are so far clear of the rest that third is the best position Taunton can hope for.

Taunton suffered the loss of several key players at different stages of the season and it is to the credit of the current first team squad that the club is still comfortably situated near the top of the league. The home supporters have had excellent entertainment with only one defeat in their home fixtures and have been treated to plenty of exciting rugby. The most recent match at the time of writing was a win by 38 - 33 against Macclesfield who fought back from 31-7 down in the last 15 minutes. Real edge of the seat stuff with a sigh of relief as the final whistle blew to halt the comeback.

Last year the club held a Gala dinner to launch the 150 years celebrations with guest speakers as part of the entertainment. This year, being the 150th anniversary, there will be an another celebration dinner with a five course meal. The event will be held on 17th May and it is hoped that many local people will feel proud of the club's achievements, its longevity and its successes. Letter from Rev. Jim

In my early 20's I worked as a barman in a sea-side hotel on the west coast of France. I did 2 summer seasons. which was hard work but very enjoyable. There were 3 of us running the bar and we developed a competitive game whereby we tried to be the first to correctly guess the nationality of the punters as they came in. If we hadn't



decided before they spoke, we generally considered that cheating and there were prizes and forfeits usually involving who cleaned the beer pumps at the end of the shift, so it was serious stuff.

English, French and German were usually a quick-spot; if we hesitated, we generally learned that they would turn out to be Dutch.

All of which leads me on to wonder if Christians are in any way identifiable – even before they speak. They say that 95% of communication is non-verbal, so what is the bodylanguage of the body of Christ? Nationally the picture is pretty grim. But I'm not too worried about that. That's for the media and important people like bishops to sort out. That's not what affects the lives of most of us. Are our local churches - of all shades and stripes - witnessing to the unconditional love of God? Because that's the only thing that matters and that should be our main defining feature. So, at the very heart of our churches, we hope to focus on good relationships, a concern for the community and a sympathetic engagement with issues of the day. Let us know if we are not!

Annual Parish Meeting





Community Matters

The **Community Café** is open every Wednesday from 2pm until 3:30pm and is open to everyone in the community with free hot drinks and refreshments, the perfect place to catch up with friends or to meet new people. We have the **Knit**

and Crochet Group join us most weeks. We also enjoy seeing the children and families that pop in after school for a hot chocolate each week. On the 3rd Wednesday of each month we run the Repair Café. Please come along, we have a few handy volunteers who are up for a challenge! Old electrical items that can be repaired and reused or perhaps alterations to some clothing? We also offer support to people with any IT issues who maybe struggling with online forms or websites, please pop in on these days for some support.

We have also been running our **Loss** and **Bereavement Drop in Cafe** on the 1st Wednesday of every month to offer support and a safe space to talk and share the difficulties and challenges of losing someone you love.

Our **Stay and Play Group** runs every Thursday at the BACH from 10:30am to 12noon. There is no charge for the group. This is an informal group which enables parents in our community to



meet other parents and gives little ones the opportunity to play. We accept donations for our café, repair café and stay and play via our QR code.

Youth Cafe

We run a Youth Café after school each Wednesday from 3:30pm until 5:30pm at the BACH. Here, secondary age young people can come for a range of donated foods from the community fridge and a hot drink. The young people form part of the planning for this group and we have a pool table, table tennis and craft activities which they enjoy. We will be inviting Y6 young people to attend after Easter from 3:30pm until 4:45pm to support them with their transition to secondary school, they will have the opportunity to chat with the older students about secondary school as well as socialise and have fun

Mandy Cooper, our volunteer, completed her Youth Work Level 2 Training which involved over 40 hours of sessions and many more hours of independent study. Mandy has been instrumental in ensuring that we have all the correct policies and procedures in place as well as being dedicated to our young people and the values of youth work support. We would like to say a big thank you to Mandy for all her hard work.



THE GIFT THAT KEEPS ON GIVING THINKING OF A UNIQUE GIFT FOR YOURSELF OR A LOVED ONE!

We are seeking donations in order that a Pavilion can be erected to house the POPPY OF HONOUR at Somerset Wood in the Maidenbrook Country Park in Taunton. When built it will become an official Commonwealth War Memorial. Visitors will be able to view Free of Charge.

The POPPY holds 1,117,635 individual remembrance poppies inside its encasement, representing the number of British and Commonwealth servicemen and servicewomen listed by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission as 'Killed In Action' or 'Missing In Action' together with those 'Shot at Dawn' then later pardoned and those who died from their wounds after the Armistice in WW1. You will have the unique opportunity to have yours or a loved one's name on a plaque. Businesses can also contribute. These will be placed near to the pavilion for all to view for perpetuity.

Minimum donations are £25 for a small plaque, £50 for a medium and £75 for a large plaque.

This operation will continue until funding is complete.

HYPE (Hestercombe Youth Project Evolving)

Hestercombe Local Community Network (LCN) meet regularly to discuss common issues and Children and Young People have been one of the top priorities for this LCN. A steering group has been meeting for sometime to look at provision for young people which has led to some initial funding for consultation with young people. Following this initial research West Monkton Parish Council applied for funding from SALC (Somerset Association of Local Councils) for a youth project on behalf of the Hestercombe LCN. This application was successful, and we are now able to extend our research to provide the 'Boombox', see poster below. The Boombox is a Youth Club on wheels and will be going out into our communities until August. We will be promoting the existing provisions during these sessions as well as looking at what else young people want going forward, with a view to planning provision from August onwards.

Our Companion Volunteer has been visiting those in our local community who are isolated to offer them some company through a cuppa and a chat. Our volunteer has an enhanced DBS check as well as first aid and safeguarding training.



'Keep our Parish Tidy' Volunteers



9th May All We Imagine as Light India 2024 Cert: 15 1 hour 55 minutes




This is an absorbing study of three nurses in modern-day Mumbai and it is a glorious film. The light, the lives, and the textures of contemporary, working-class Mumbai are explored and celebrated by writer/director Payal Kapadia, who won the Grand Prix at last year's Cannes Film Festival for her revelatory fiction feature debut. The film alights on moments of connection and heartache, hope and disappointment. There is a freshness and emotional clarity in the film, an enriching humanity and gentleness which coexist with fervent, languorous eroticism and finally something epiphanic in the later scenes and mysterious final moments.

13th June Agent of Happiness Bhutan 2024 Documentary Cert: 12A 1 hour 34 minutes

In Bhutan, they measure progress not just by GDP, but also Gross National Happiness. This quiet, gently absorbing documentary follows two "happiness agents" as they travel door-to-door, like census workers, collecting data for the government's happiness survey. There are 148 questions in total. Do you own a tractor? Goats? What about chickens? When was the last time you cried? Do you trust your neighbours? The agent compiles the answers into a table and

crunches the data into an individual happiness score of between 0 and 10.
Really, this is a

Really, this is a film that quietly, intimately



observes the lives of ordinary people. Co-directors Arun Bhattarai and Dorottya Zurbó are not interested in analysing the Gross National Happiness index, whether it's a gimmicky stunt or if the government meaningfully translates it into policy. It's gorgeously shot with much food for thought.

We are entering a Brave New World. You can hardly avoid the rise of artificial intelligence or Al. Al systems are very clever 'computer



programs' that can simulate conversation and some level of creativity. And it's coming to a PC or Mac near you. Many readers will be using Microsoft Word, Excel and PowerPoint software on their computers. Most people pay for this software through an annual subscription called Microsoft 365. Hitherto, this has cost £59 for 'Microsoft 365 Personal' or £79 for the 'Family' version.

But Microsoft have recently hiked the price up the massively. 'Personal' will now be £85 a year and 'Family' a whopping £105. The reason for these price increases? The inclusion of the recently created "Copilot Al". You see, the problem with Al is that it takes huge computing power in these massive server centres. It eats electricity for breakfast and that electricity has to be paid for.

So, if you do nothing, your next annual renewal for renting the 365 package will automatically increase. There are some benefits to Copilot AI - although I would maintain that is predominantly in a business environment. I write this column for home users of computers and I'm less convinced that Copilot has genuine daily use.

Good news! You can actually downgrade your subscription to what they are now calling 'Microsoft 365 Personal CLASSIC' and 'Family CLASSIC'. Guess what? These new classic- named packages - which are not advertised on their main website - are the packages you are currently using at £59 and £79 respectively - without the new Copilot Al functionality.

Even if you're months away from the automatic renewal, you can log into your Microsoft Account, choose the option to Cancel Plan and then you're offered to 'downgrade' to one of the Classic plans - i.e. stick with what you've always paid for. Then when your next renewal comes around you will simply pay the same price as you paid last time.

If you have recently renewed at the higher price, you will have to contact Microsoft via a chat system in order to get them to revert you to the lower plan.

As a marketing ploy, this move by Microsoft to increase everybody's subscription by such a substantial amount, to pay for new Al features many don't need, is an underhand cash grab.

You have to act to stand still, on this one. Some would say that isn't very intelligent!

A Rare Visitor

Being a wildlife photographer in my spare time and having had this hobby for approximately 7 years, I have picked up a certain amount of knowledge about wildlife and birds. I particularly love birds and when we moved into our house in Monkton Heathfield in November 2024 I was keen to install various bird feeders to

see what species I could attract to the garden.



On Thursday 27th February I was sat in my lounge having a nice cup of tea after work when I noticed a bird fly down into my garden. It looked like a Starling, but the colours were different, although difficult to tell as it was late afternoon and the bird was on the floor in the shadows. I did not want to scare it off by moving closer to the patio doors, so took a few photos of it through the glass of the patio doors.

I put the somewhat dull pictures up on a social media page called Somerset Wildlife Photography as I knew there were quite a few people on the site who knew a lot more about birds than I did. I was feeling a little embarrassed that the photos were so bad, but immediately people were messaging me and telling me that I had a Rose-coloured Starling in my garden. I had heard of the Rose-coloured Starling, but had

never seen one and really did not expect to see one either, let alone have one drop into my garden! I was keen to find out more about the Rose-coloured Starling and discovered it is a scarce visitor to the UK, they breed from Turkey and Ukraine east to Mongolia and winter in India. The RSPB report there are on average only 100 sightings of them in the UK each year, and they are usually spotted within flocks of Starlings. This

bird was identified as being a first year male.

The sighting generated a lot of interest from bird watchers and photographers who all wanted to see this bird, but I had no idea whether it would return or not. However, the next day he flew down into the garden again and I discovered he was attracted by the sultanas that I put out every day for the Blackbirds. He also liked the fat balls hanging in the garden. He became a daily visitor to my

garden, some days visiting up to 8 times. Word soon spread about the location of the bird and we began noticing lots of people with long camera lenses and binoculars at the bottom of our garden, which was a little disconcerting, however I knew they were not in fact looking into our house, but searching the shrubs and trees for sightings of the rare visitor.

Being a wildlife photographer, I own a chair hide so I set it up in the garden so that I could take better photos



of the bird and also set up some suitable perches for him. One was an old wooden-handled spade and another was a piece of branch that I found whilst out walking my dog. I would place a little bit of fat ball on both perches and it was not long before the Rosecoloured Starling found them.

A few friends came to visit me who are also wildlife photographers to see if they could get photos of the bird too and, to my relief, he appeared for all of them. We were hoping that he would stay until the summer because their full plumage comes in then and they are truly beautiful, unfortunately that does not appear to be the case as, just over 3 weeks since he first appeared, the Rose-coloured Starling has not been spotted since Friday 21st March, so it would appear he has sadly now moved on.

I feel extremely privileged that this rare visitor chose my garden to visit and I do miss seeing him, but it was a wonderful experience.
